

E. J. ALEXANDER OF HIGH SCHOOL TO VOCATIONAL

Will be in Charge of Technical High School Course

REPORT ON THE NEW BUILDING IS READ

Some Things to be Adjusted—Meeting of Trustees Held

The teachers' committee last night at the Saint John School Board agreed to the transfer of E. J. Alexander from the staff of the High School to the staff of the Vocational School, where Mr. Alexander will be in charge of the new department, the technical high school course, which is to lead to engineering and similar vocations. Mr. Alexander's appointment to the Vocational School will make possible the placing of special emphasis on academic studies for the vocational pupils.

The teachers' committee authorized Dr. S. A. Worrell, superintendent of city schools, to make what arrangements were necessary in the High School either in the closing of a class room there or in appointing a teacher to take over the duties which Mr. Alexander will relinquish. Dr. Worrell submitted a full report on the organization in the schools on the opening of the fall term and was authorized to open a new grade one

in a school where there are now 78 pupils in one class of grade 1.

BOARD MEETING

This need for adjustments and minor alterations in the Saint John Vocational School and the present situation with regard to payments on that building were the chief matters discussed at the meeting of the Board of School Trustees held last evening. It was expected that arrangements would be made shortly for taking over the building from the contractors.

Dr. L. M. Curren, chairman, presided. Others present were: Mrs. E. R. Taylor, W. C. Cross, T. H. Carter, S. W. Palmer, H. Colby Smith, E. R. W. Ingraham, Dr. J. K. Higgins, Dr. S. A. Worrell, superintendent of city schools, and A. Gordon Leavitt, secretary.

Application for appointment as carpenter was received from T. G. Northrup, while James J. Glass, James E. Wolfe and John E. Welsh applied for appointment as janitors.

Miss Emma Kee, teacher, applied for leave of absence and her communication was referred to the teachers' committee.

H. S. Brennan, acting for the architect, the late F. Neil Brodie, last approved payment of \$1,000 to the contractor for painting the Vocational School.

Mr. Carter reported that the painting was not according to specifications and not satisfactory.

The meeting voted to refer the matter to a committee composed of Mr. Carter, Mr. Palmer and Mr. Cross, with power to act.

BUILDING COMMITTEE.

The buildings committee reported that tenders for painting had been awarded to the lowest tenderers as follows: For St. Joseph's school, H. L. MacGowan, \$489; a wall of new Albert School, H. L. MacGowan, \$80.

visitors to Victoria Annex were given authority to have one room painted. Reports of boiler inspections were received and referred to the visitors to the buildings.

The finance committee reported having invested \$24,000 of sinking funds as follows: \$14,000 in Town of Bathurst 2 per cent. bonds at \$100.00; \$800 of City of Saint John 5 per cent. bonds at \$101.80 and \$800 of City of Fredericton 5 per cent. bonds at \$101.80.

INSPECTOR'S REPORT.

The report of George Hennessey, the building inspector, gave exact details of work to be repaired or adjusted at the Vocational School, in order to have the work conform to the specifications.

It was a very lengthy list but most of the items were of minor importance.

Mr. Carter said 75 doors in the new school would not shut, 10 sets of door knobs were missing and the doors of all the cabinets either would not open or would not close. The light shades in the auditorium did not suit and the auditorium floor bulged so that the seats could not be placed in one section. All the burpup was loose throughout the building.

Mr. Leavitt said he was told the woodwork would shrink when the building was heated.

Mr. Hennessey said that the woodwork in Holy Trinity school had expanded similarly but went back in place when the building was heated.

AUDITORIUM SEATS.

The matter of the auditorium seats presented a problem as the seats were purchased and installed and if the floor was swollen now it might mean there would be a hollow later.

The report of Mr. Hennessey was referred to a special committee with power to act.

FINAL PAYMENTS.

Dr. Curren reported that final adjustments in payments on the Vocational School waited on the receipt of legal advice.

The main building, as a building, was agreed to be one of the best constructed, but certain details and small matters prevented the winding up of the business and the formal taking over of the building.

MYSTERY IN RETURN OF VALUABLE BOOK

Fifteenth Century Manuscript Stolen in New York, is Returned

NEW YORK, Sept. 14.—The Fifteenth century Attavanti manuscript which disappeared on Aug. 25 from the National Arts Club, Gramercy Park, has been returned to its owner, Dr. Otto Vollbehr, by Edward M. Garlock, an attorney. Mr. Garlock presented the old manuscript book of prayers for the dead to Dr. Vollbehr in the presence of Charles K. Carpenter, a member of the Board of Governors of the National Arts Club.

Through Mr. Garlock it was impossible to penetrate the mystery surrounding the recovery of the book which was supposedly stolen from the National Arts Club, where it was in a collection of literary treasures lent by Dr. Vollbehr. Mr. Garlock said he represented a client who was acting for a friend—an amateur book collector—who had purchased the valuable volume from "a stranger." He said the friend of his client had paid \$1,500.

Dr. Vollbehr, a wealthy German bibliophile, who is living at the Waldorf, was delighted when the precious manuscript book, known as "Oficium Mortuorum" was placed in his hands.

An unusual feature of the incident, pointed out by Dr. Vollbehr, was that the thief, undoubtedly a man of culture and with a knowledge of rare books, had neglected to erase the owner's library filing number from the fly-leaf, and also left a letter, written to Dr. Vollbehr by Leo S. Olshki, editor of La Bibliophile, Florence, Italy, offering \$5,000 Swiss francs for the book, between its front pages.

"Those things and the fact that a man would buy this book for \$1,500 on a few minutes' notice are very mysterious," Dr. Vollbehr said. "Obviously the unknown purchaser knew it to be worthwhile and he certainly must have known that it was worth a great deal more than what he paid for it. It was a strange business."
