SAINT JOHN LADY HONORED

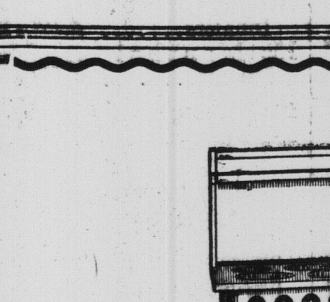
