UNITED CHURCH NEARING OBJECTIVE

Subscriptions to Maintenance and Extension Fund Already Reaches

MONCTON, Feb. 17.—That 90 per cent. of the \$4,000,000 objective set for the maintenance and extension fund of the United Church of Canada, for the year ending March 31 next, had been subscribed up to the present time, was the statement made here today by Rev. Robert Laird, B.D., of Toronto, one of the treasurers of the church, before a conference of representatives of the Presbyteries of New Bruns-wick and P. E. Island, held in St. John's church. The amount of this fund required to be raised in this province has also been suscribed to about the same percentage as is the case in the general fund.

The meeting opened at 2.30 o'clock with Prof. Watson of Mount Allison Univeristy, in the chair, and with Rev. W. MacN. Matthews, of Saint John, as secretary. Rev. Robert Laird out-lined the object of the meeting which was to ascertain the status of the fund was to ascertain the status of the fund in this province and to devise ways and means to ensure the full objective being reached by the end of the church year. He gave an illustrative address in the course of which he reviewed the work that was being carried on throughout the Dominion in connection with the financial campaign and pointed out the various difficulties that had been encountered and finally sur-mounted. He referred to the different percentages of the objectives that had been reached in the other parts of the Dominion, and said that New Bruns-wick stood about the average.
