His argument that because the acting ministers have not been sworn in, on their own admission last night, and the fact that their seats are technically vacant because the order-in-council appointing them did not state that it was without salary, have, in the minds of the Liberals, made the Con-

alleled session of parliament historic in Canadian annals. From present prospects the battle is likely to go over to next week with the outcome still uncertain, for the Liberals are determined to fight this issue to a finish. They believe the Conservatives "smuggled themselves into power," as one member put it in the House, and they propose to leave no stone to convict the Conservatives of this brand of smuggling.

In this attitude, the Liberals tonight had the support of J. S. Woodsworth, Winnipeg, Labor, and E. J. Garland, Progressive, of Bow River, who appears to have assumed the leadership of the agricultural group laid down by Robert Forke and whose anti-imperialistic tendencies are well known.

The purpose of the Liberal-Progressive manoeuvre is clearly that of making the question of the Governor-General's exercise of his prerogative in refusing dissolution of Parliament to Mr King, the issue of the next general election in place of the record of the former ministry in the administration of
