BOARD REnews CERTIFICATE OF PACKING CO.

Public Utilities Order Follows
Sessions Held Here on
Wednesday

THE New Brunswick Board of Public Utilities, following two special sessions held on Wednesday, has issued an order granting a renewal of the British Canadian Packing Co.'s certificate to sell stock within the province. The Board further ordered that the commission for the sale of the stock should not exceed 15 per cent and that all selling agents' licenses should be cancelled. Agents may apply for renewal of their licenses and their applications will be treated on their merits and receive due consideration. The report follows:

"The Board having ordered an audit of the Company's books on the 23rd day of June instant, A. E. Cox, under the Commission's instructions prepared and submitted an audit report on the 24th day of June last, which was filed with the Board.

"W. H. Harrison, K. C. and H. A. Forster with him appeared on behalf of the company, together with the vice-president, G. C. P. McIntyre, P. J. Hughes, K. C., for James Griffiths, a shareholder and also for I. J. Goldberg, solicitor for Earl E. Lester and Dr. Arthur Cunningham, shareholders. The Board renewed the Company's certificate to sell stock within the Province of New Brunswick, ordering that a commission of not more than fifteen per cent, to be paid for the sale of the stock, and that any arrangement which the Company may make with anyone to sell at a greater percentage must first have the approval of the Board.

"In renewing the Company's license, the Board does not sanction nor has at any time sanctioned any sales otherwise made at more than fifteen per cent.

"The Board further orders that all existing agents' licenses be cancelled. Holders of present agents' licenses may apply for renewal, and their applications will be treated on their merits and receive due consideration by the Board.

The Liberal Viewpoint

OTTAWA, July 1.—So far as tactical advantage is concerned, the Liberals are persuaded that they "struck bottom" on Monday afternoon when Mr. King resigned as Prime Minister in the House of Commons. From their standpoint, there is a wealth of meaning in the jocular remark made today by one of their members, "we will let the Conservatives know now how it feels to man the pumps."

REMARKABLE SPEECH
In a remarkable speech in the House last night, the Liberal leader served notice on the acting government that the authority of that government would never be recognized by the acting opposition, that that government "has never been born." His argument that because the acting ministers have not been sworn in, on their own admission last night, and the fact that their seats are technically vacant because the order-in-council appointing them did not state that it was without salary, have, in the minds of the Liberals, made the Conservative position untenable.

VITAL ISSUE
It is this vital issue of the principles of responsible government raised by Mr. King last night, and debate upon which is again occupying the House on this vital day of the Dominion that is making this already unparalleled session of parliament historic in Canadian annals.

From present prospects the battle is likely to go over to next week with the outcome still uncertain, for the Liberals are determined to fight this issue to a finish. They believe the Conservatives "smuggled themselves into power," as one member put it in the House, and they propose to leave no stone unturned to convict the Conservatives of this brand of smuggling.

NO ELECTION FOR TWO YEARS
From corridor gossip, there is a situation within a situation. In addition to that which is more apparent and which has already been indicated in these paragraphs, there is the minor arising over a generally known undertaking given to the Alberta Progressives by the Conservatives that there would be no election for two years.

The Conservative board of strategy want an election this year. The understanding given on behalf of Mr. Meighen to the Progressives stands in the way of such a contest. It is freely stated today that the Conservatives yesterday would have welcomed a defeat in the House that would have released them from their obligation to the Progressives and, in their mind, put them in command of dissolution.

The Liberals, too, of course, would like to defeat the Conservatives in the House in the belief that it would this time put Mr. King unmistakably in command of dissolution. But, in the case of both major parties, the "finger" group in the Progressive party stands in the way because of their anxiety to have another session.

"GINGER GROUP" SOLID
While the "Ginger" group was solid against the Liberals in the fight on the report of the customs committee, some of them are disposed to align with the Liberals on this question of the apparent violation of some of the principles of responsible government, and many of the remarks tonight of E. J. Garland (Bow River, Alta.) indicate his leaning toward the acting opposition.

For this reason the Liberals are in a from without hope that they will be able to force a dissolution. In any case, their feelings are expressed, maybe too freely, by the famous words of General Grant, "We will fight it out on these lines if it takes all summer."

The Conservative View

OTTAWA, July 1.—The members of the late MacKenzie King government and the Liberal wing of the Progressive party are making a desperate effort to subordinate the scandal of the customs service to the constitutional question of the right of the new provisional Conservative ministry to hold office. To this end, Liberals and Progressives are now endeavoring to prevent the new government from functioning and late tonight Hon. J. A. Robb moved what amounted to a non-confidence motion in the House. Mr. Robb's motion was to the effect that the acting cabinet created by Mr. Meighen, which had no constitutional authority for administering the affairs of the country.

PURPOSE PLAIN
The purpose of the Liberal-Progressive manoeuvre is clearly that of making the question of the Governor-General's exercise of his prerogative in refusing dissolution to Parliament to Mr. King, the issue of the next general election in place of the record of the former ministry in the administration of the Customs department.

It is stated in the corridors of Parliament tonight that the Liberals and those Progressives who are co-operating with them have decided to go the length of maintaining indefinitely their obstruction of the new government in order to establish before the country their attitude on the constitutional question.

TO FORCE DIVISION
They are determined to force a division on the House on the right of the provisional government to carry on and to continue to hold up supply even should the majority of the House be against them.

The attitude that will be taken by these Progressives who would not uphold the former government on the customs scandal issue is a subject of speculation. There is a feeling that the new government is in danger, that the Progressives may refuse to give it an opportunity to conclude the business of the session.

The contention of Mr. King that the Governor-General should not have refused to accept his advice on Monday appeals to the members of the third party, who object to what they term the interference of His Majesty's representative in the conduct of government.

It is believed, however, that these Progressives who voted with the Conservatives in the divisions which preceded the fall of the King ministry will vote with the new government. The division is expected to be close and it may even be decided by the casting vote of Speaker Lemieux.

Conservative viewpoint.
Liberals argue that if they can make it impossible for the Meighen Government to function the new Prime Minister will be compelled to tender his resignation and to recommend that the task of carrying on be again entrusted to Mr. King. They are still desirous of having control of the election machinery when the appeal is made to the people.

Although the stand taken by MacKenzie King in dragging the Governor-General into the political arena is depicted in parliamentary circles it has not greatly surprised those who have followed his tendencies since he became leader of the Liberal party. Mr. King is well content, it is felt, to submit that as an issue to the country. He counts, it is said, on his attitude appealing to the radical elements of the west.

The Robb resolution now before the House is interpreted by Conservatives as being in effect a motion of censure on the action of the Governor-General in installing Mr. Meighen and his acting cabinet in office. It is stated in Conservative quarters at midnight that Premier Meighen may meet the Liberal-Progressive tactics by immediately asking the Governor-General to dissolve Parliament.

MONCTON FIREMEN CALLED OUT TWICE

Two Blazes in Same House at
Early Hour This

MONCTON, N. B., July 2.—The city fire department was called out for a fire which was discovered in the house situated at 182 Albert street. The fire had evidently obtained a good start before being noticed, and the back portion of the building in the down stairs was practically all ablaze when the firemen arrived on the scene, but it was not long before the fire was completely under control.

The building is owned by Mrs. Florence McAtee, who was so unfortunate as to lose her store next to the present building by fire a few months ago. The building was occupied by Mr. and Mrs. James Store, who were away for the holiday and who could not be reached this morning. The origin of the fire is unknown.

The building was badly gutted by the flames, and also suffered extensive water damage, while the contents in the back portion of the house will be a total loss.

A second alarm from the same box called the firemen out again at 3:05 o'clock for a blaze which had broken out in the upstairs portion of the same building. A quick turnout was made and the flames were extinguished.

CHANGE PLANNED IN ROMANIAN REGENCY

Aversco Would Nullify Bratiano's
Scheme and Name
Queen Marie

BUCHAREST, July 2.—One of the most important measures contemplated by General Averesco, who now holds the post of Romanian minister to the League of Nations, is to nullify the regency created by former Premier Bratiano.

It is his plan to invest Queen Marie with the powers of a Regent in the event of King Ferdinand's death. It seems to be the belief of all patriotic Romanians that the creation of Prince Carol's four year old son, Michael, as Crown Prince, with Prince Nicholas, Carol's younger brother, and the chief justice of the Supreme Court, and Patriarch of Rumania forming a regency until the infant Prince Michael becomes of age, is fraught with danger.

It is argued that the present regency at best, would be only a political instrument in the hands of Bratiano and it almost entirely of his creation.

If General Averesco succeeds in putting his plan into effect, it is believed that the event of King Ferdinand's death, would succeed him as the active sovereign of Rumania. General Averesco, a strong force of character, broad sympathies, a keen intellect, executive ability and a deep knowledge of international and domestic affairs.

NEWCASTLE, N. B., July 1.—Arthur O'Connell, rowing champion of Halifax, won a great rowing race here this afternoon from Harry Giggley and Willie Logan. It was a thrilling finish, Giggley almost overtaking the winner with a wonderful spurt on the home stretch but the younger from Halifax could not be headed.

The three scullers went down to the turn almost abreast neither one having any advantage. O'Connell started to lengthen his stroke when about a quarter mile from the finish line and drew away from Giggley and Logan. Giggley kept in close but the Halifax boy crossed the line about half a length ahead of Giggley and two lengths ahead of Logan. The time was 12:02.

Presents \$100,000 Fee To Hungarian Poor

Jeremiah Smith, Boston Expert Economist, Refuses Two Years
Salary, Although Not Wealthy Himself; Says Poor
Need It More Than He Does

BUDAPEST, July 1.—Jeremiah Smith, Boston economist, who recently completed his work of reorganizing Hungary's finances, today presented his salary of \$100,000 for his two years' work to the Hungarian people. The Boston financial expert told Premier Bethlen that the friendship and appreciation of the Hungarian people were all that he wished for his service.

When Mr. Smith called on Premier Bethlen to take final leave, Count Bethlen handed him a check for \$100,000 representing two years' salary as League supervisor of Hungary's finances.

"Give it to charity," said the American, as he handed the check back to the astonished Prime Minister. "Your poor need it more than I do."

"But it is your compensation for your two years' service to us," argued Count Bethlen.

"The only compensation I desire for my work is the appreciation and friendship of the Hungarian people," answered Mr. Smith, who, although by no means wealthy himself, felt that he could not conscientiously accept even

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Business In Moncton Is On Upgrade

MONCTON, July 1.—Buildings valued at \$195,408 are being constructed in the city this year. This represents an increase of more than \$135,000 over the value of those started in the corresponding period last year and the year before, when the figures were \$59,489 and \$50,085 respectively. The bank clearings for the month of June are more than \$380,000 greater than they were in June, 1925, according to the figure received from the local clearing house today. This is a continuation of the improvement shown throughout the year and brings the Moncton total for the six months period some hundreds of thousands of dollars greater than it was in 1925 and 1924.
