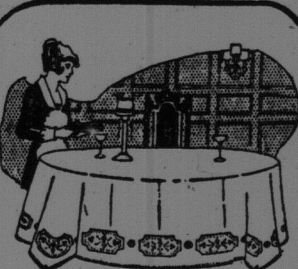

More interesting meetings would be a means of strengthening the organization, he believed. In closing he urged as an ideal an enlarged membership.

Miss McCloskey extended the hearty thanks of the meeting to Father Cloran. An invitation was received from the Moncton sub-division to hold the next meeting in Moncton and the invitation was gratefully accepted. Selections by the orchestra and a vocal solo by Miss Gertrude O'Neill for whom Miss Vids Waterbury was accompanist were included in the fine musical programme and the singing of "O Canada" closed the meeting.

PEACE BUREAU IN CANADA SUGGESTED

Miss McPhail Has Proposal Ready for Session of Parliament.

Ottawa, Oct. 31.—Many legislative proposals, some of them familiar and others unique, will be put forth at the next session of Parliament, judging by the number of notices already received. There are 24 of them ready for the initial order paper. Agnes McPhail wants a peace bureau established to promote international good-will, while another proposal of hers will be to pay penitentiary convicts for their work apart from the cost of their keep, the money to go to their dependents or, if they have none, to be kept for themselves. Somewhat in line with the former will be a proposal by Irvine of Calgary, against any co-operative preparation with other countries for war without the primary sanction of Parliament.

William Good, of Brant, is coming on early this time with his bill to amend the criminal code to prevent gambling on race tracks. Coate, of Alberta, will revive the demand for a central reserve bank and also call for cutting down the duty on automobiles and trucks. W. F. MacLean revives his scheme of Senate reform and desires that Canada be empowered to amend its own constitution. Abolition of the mountain differential in freight rates will be advocated by Kennedy, of Edmonton, while Andrew Knox gets in early with a resolution for the immediate completion of the Hudson Bay Railway. Garland, of Bow River, wants a conference to negotiate a sort of free trade with the world at large. A peculiar proposal to be advanced by J. S. Woodworth is that, where immigrants fail to secure employment within two years after arrival, the State will accept the responsibility for their upkeep. There are several demands for revision of the rules. One of the intentions is to provide that, where private members' regulations, after being called twice, are not proceeded with, they shall be expunged from the order paper. Every year it is cluttered with a number of resolutions that are not moved but serve as a species of advertisement in a medium that is inexpensive.

NO PARKING IN HAYMARKET SQ.

The Safety Commissioner, Mr. Harding, has instructed the police force to see that cars did not park in the street at Haymarket Square just opposite where the street cars come to a stop. The passage between the rails and the sidewalk is too narrow to permit of cars parking and the passage of other cars, and therefore it is that the whole traffic of Rothery avenue and the cars going to the suburban districts have frequently been held up because of someone who wanted to do

a little business in the stores along the street stopped his car next to the curb and, while the street cars were waiting for their passengers, prevented passage. It is difficult for the safe commissioner and the police to plea everybody, but this is a case where the public should stand behind Commissioner Harding and give him such assistance as he needs in making traffic possible where almost impossible conditions exist.

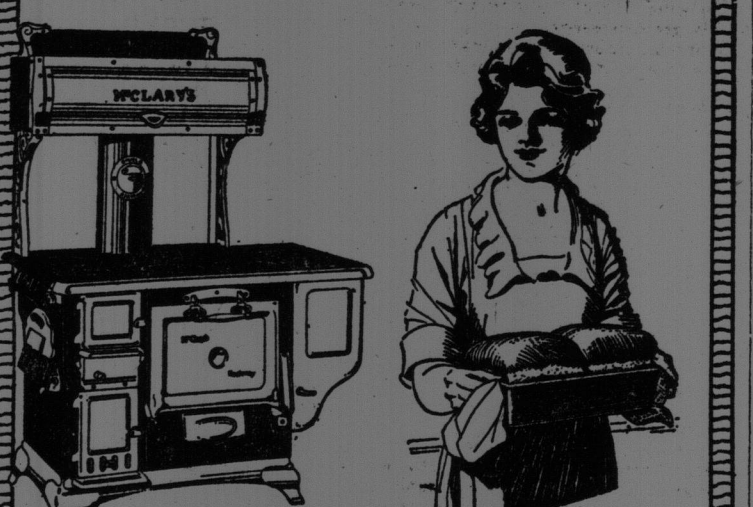

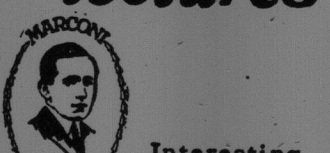

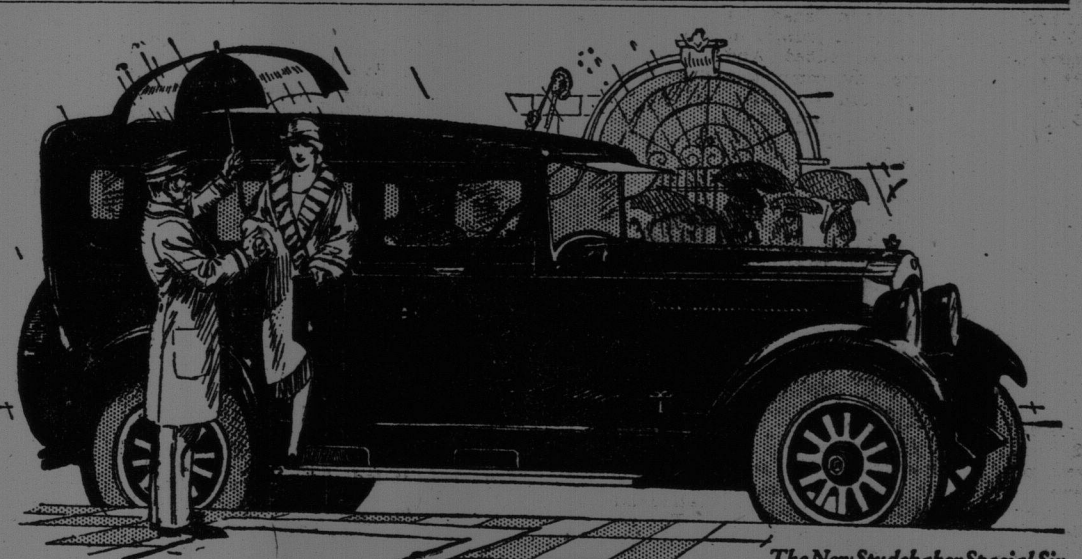
