RACE TOMORROW ON MOOSEPATH PARK

Dr. Gano and T. J. Devlin to Go Best Three Out of Five.

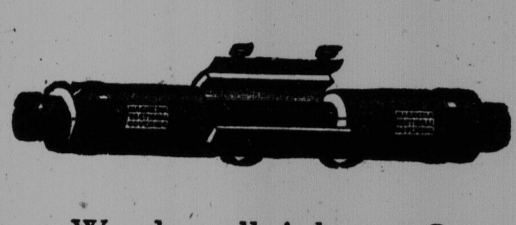

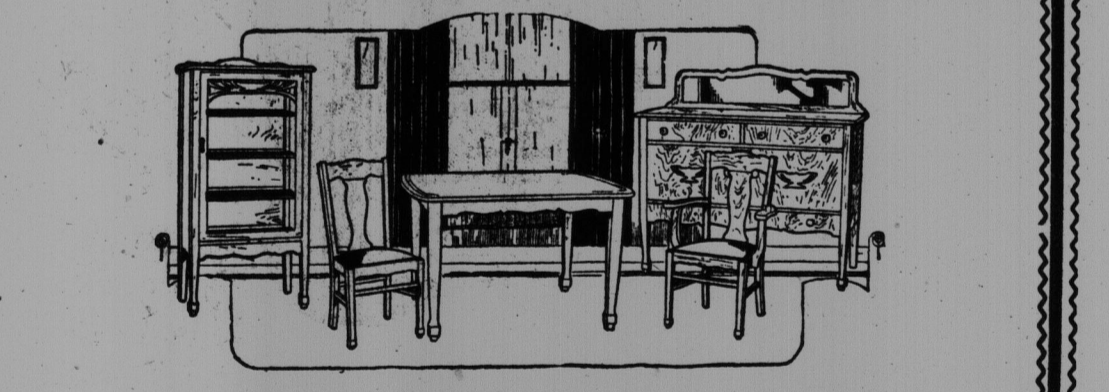
