## LOCAL NEWS

Mrs. G. A. Kuhring arrived in the city yesterday and will aid the provincial Red Cross Society in their annual membership drive. Mrs. Kuhring was largely instrumental last year in increasing the membership.

One year ago today little Sadie McLeary was found murdered in Riverview Park and her body hidden beneath a pile of stones. John Paris has been tried four times for her murder and will be tried a fifth time next month.

Fire broke out in the residence of Thomas Ross at Hampton Station last night. The blaze started from a pipe near the kitchen stove and spread quickly. The interior of the building was gutted before the flames could be got under control. The work of the Hampton fire brigade was commendable.

Miss Pickett, resident nurse at the Old Ladies' Home, on behalf of the inmates, nurses and members of the staff, last night presented to Mrs. Gilliat, the matron, a handsome club bag nicely initialed in gold on the occasion of her leaving for a two months vacation.

Mrs. Mary Seymour, Mrs. George Colwell and Mrs. Hope Thompson were the leaders in a meeting of the W. C. T. U. yesterday. A resolution was passed calling on the city council to move the fountain from the head of King street to a suitable place so that the proposed civic monument in memory of those who fell during the war could be placed where the fountain now stands.

The St. John Board of Health declared yesterday that there were no cases of infantile paralysis reported so far in this city. An epidemic of this dread disease has broken out in Hamilton to an extent of sixteen cases and has killed hospital wards there. St. John has been comparatively immune from this disease, only three cases having been reported for the year ending October 31, 1921.

In the case of the charges brought by Rev. C. G. Plimcombe of Oak Point and Brown's Flat against Archie, Herbert and Caswell Hamilton in connection with the alleged riotous behavior and breaking up a religious meeting at Brown's Flat on July, hearing was concluded before Magistrates Gorman and Morrissey yesterday and a decision will be given by August 15. B. L. Gervoy appeared for the prosecution and G. H. V. Belys, K. C., and Francis Kerr for the defense.

Very successful work is being carried out at the Rural Science school camp in Sussex, where forty-five student teachers are now taking courses in agriculture. The camp is under the direction of A. C. Gorman, director of elementary agricultural education in the province, and he is being assisted by William McIntosh, of St. John; Professor H. E. Wheelock, of Acadia University; O. C.

**TOURING ON A ONE TON TRUCK**

Texan and Wife Say More Could be Done to Get Motor Parties to Canada.

Winnipeg, Man., July 31.—(By Canadian Press).—On his second visit to Canada, the first trip being into British Columbia, G. C. Masters, of Fort Worth, Texas, who has been motor-touring continually for more than seven years, was a recent visitor in this city. He is a pioneer in this branch of touring, having started out in 1914 to see as much of the American continent as possible and adopted the only means for such an expedition—an automobile. Since that time Mr. Masters went over three cars and for his fourth vehicle is using a one ton truck.

In the course of his travels by automobile, Mr. Masters, who has been accompanied by his wife on all the journeys, has lived all the time in the open. They have camped where night overtook them and went into the highways and byways, where visitors were few and far between, as well as along the beaten track of travel. For several years they have been camping and traveling in the back of their car, but two years ago they decided that the problem of making and breaking camp at times presented too many difficulties. Mr. Masters then acquired a one ton truck on which he had constructed a movable home and in this new mode where he was able to travel.

This summer he explored the Black Hills of Dakota, taking four days to go 100 miles in order to take the shortest route to North Portal and across the border into Canada. A flexible itinerary until the fall of 1924 will keep the travelers from their home town until that time. They will journey southward from Winnipeg, visiting St. Paul and Minneapolis and will then cross into Wisconsin. They expect to spend the winter in Florida and in the spring plan to come north up the Atlantic coast to Niagara or Windsor, cross into Canada and tour Ontario, Quebec and the maritime provinces.

Lack of information regarding the highways leading into Canada is responsible for keeping many motor tourists from coming this far north, according to Mr. Masters. "Down in the southern states there are many motorists who make a tour every year, who would like to visit Canada, but they are unable to get the necessary information. It is only from information obtained from travelers or the advance guard of motorists that this information is obtainable or you would have a greater number of visitors from down Texas way," he said.

**DYNAMITE ON STREET CAR TRACK**

Found Before Damage was Done on Buffalo Strike Line—Jitney Competition Question.

Buffalo, Aug. 2.—Twelve short sticks of dynamite, bound together with wire and covered with tin foil, were found on the International Railway Company's tracks near the Hertel avenue barns yesterday, enough explosive to wreck a street car.

The International Railway Company yesterday made its first move in the courts to kill off the competition of automobiles which have been using the street traffic for a month. Justice Pooley granted an order calling upon Mayor Schwab to show cause why a writ of mandamus should not be issued compelling him to enforce state laws relating to vehicle traffic. The order is returnable tomorrow.

2.—English and Dutch to be the official languages and to enjoy equal rights.

3.—Rhodesia will send one representative to the Union of South Africa house of assembly, but provisions are to be made

**BLOCK BILLS IN BRITISH HOUSE**

London, Aug. 2.—(Canadian Press).—In the House of Commons, yesterday, there were some echoes of Monday night's all-night session. The Independent-Lefts, feeling aggrieved at the application of closure on Monday night and the manner in which it was applied and as a protest, blocked a series of private bills which would have gone through in the normal course. There was also a certain amount of liveliness at question time, but the house was weary after the prolonged debate of yesterday and, having disposed of the painful business of expelling Horatio Bottomley, it dealt with several minor matters in a very somnolent mood.

## BUY POLICE STATION FENCE

Two Men Say They Were Swindled on Flushing Avenue Property.

New York, Aug. 2.—Martin Greenfield of 2925 West Fifteenth street, Coney Island, and Max Konowith of 21 Avenue B, Manhattan, "bought" the old iron fence about the abandoned Flushing avenue police station for \$10, and admitted they had been swindled. They were arraigned before Magistrate Ellerin in the Gates avenue court, Brooklyn.

Policeman McDonald of the Classon station discovered the two men yesterday and took them to the police station. They said they had paid \$10 for the fence and were taking it away for junk.

"I guess that some one swindled us," Greenfield said in court. "We paid the \$10 all right, and though we could make a profit on the fence."

The magistrate paroled them pending an investigation.

## WILL SUPPORT THE ROAD RULE CHANGE

An executive meeting of the New Brunswick Automobile Association was held on Monday, at which matters of interest to the members were discussed. The secretary reported that up to June 30 there had been 287 enquiries received and answered concerning the best roads for motor travel in the province. Since July 1 there had been an average of seven letters received and seven motorists visiting the office per day. Satisfactory reports were received from representatives throughout the province. About 550 road guides and maps of the province have been issued since the first of the year. It was decided at the meeting to co-operate with Hon. P. J. Veniot, minister of public works, in the "drive to the right" ordinance, which is to come into effect on December 1 of this year.

**"PRINCE" SHAKES SWORD AT RAIDERS; IS HELD**  
Detectives, Seeking Sailors, Anger "Ceas" Bodyguard When They Knock on His Door.  
New York, Aug. 2.—A man who said he was Prince Louis Henri de Chateaux-Deussing de Bourbon, clad in a white tunic, black corduroy trousers, tan shoes and a strip of mourning for the Czar, in whose bodyguard he said he was prominent, appeared in the West Side court to answer a charge of disorderly conduct. It is near the fleet landing, and sailors from the North Atlantic Squadron were suspected of being in one of the apartments. So detectives of inspector Boylan's staff went to the house Saturday night to look it over. When they knocked at the door of the prince's apartment he came to the door, scantily clad and waving a sword. McAllister said he regretted the intrusion and withdrew, but that did not mollify the prince. A few minutes later he rushed out, clad in the uniform of a Russian major general, clinking his sword in his scabbard and saying things about policemen.

"I'm a prince and a veteran of the world war," he exclaimed. Click. "I'm a war veteran, and I don't let any one insult me, whether he be prince or pauper," exclaimed McAllister, as he clapped his hand on the aristocratic shoulder of the de Bourbon. Then followed the trip to the police station and to court.
