Mrs. Charles M. Bice

Waterboro, March 8.—T. M. Wiggins has received word that his sister, Mrs. Charles M. Bice, had passed away at her home, Arthur House, Britannia Bay, after an illness of about two weeks. Miss Nydia Wiggins, a niece, and a graduate nurse, was with her aunt when the end came. Mrs. Bice was greatly beloved by all who knew her, for her kindness and goodness of heart, for which, in the summer months when she resided at her beautiful home on the western side of the Grand Lake, she was the soul of hospitality to all who came and all who went were sure of a hearty welcome. On Aug. 2, 1892, Mrs. Bice, who was then Miss Susie A. G. Wiggins, was married to T. Stone Wiggins, who died on Aug. 14, 1910. A few years after she married Charles M. Bice, a judge of one of the courts in Denver (Col.). Mrs. Bice was the third daughter of the late Captain Vincent White and Charlotte Elizabeth Wiggins. When a young woman, under the same de plume of Guntz, she had a warm controversy with the Bishop of Ottawa on the deceased wife's sister bill, and she was largely instrumental in having the bill passed. The body was brought to Waterboro this afternoon for burial next to Dr. E. Stone Wiggins. Besides her only brother, T. M. Wiggins, Mrs. Bice leaves to mourn three sisters. They are: Mrs. E. W. Branson, of Uxma (N. Y.); Mrs. Mary Duncan, Woburn (Mass.); and Mrs. Caroline Bennison, of Duluth (Minn.).

The death occurred yesterday at the General Public Hospital of Edwin E. Ashe, aged forty-five years, after four days illness. He leaves his wife and five children. He was born in New Hampshire, U.S.A., and came to St. John about nine years ago. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon from his late residence, 815 Germain street. Service at 2.30 o'clock.



MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

The crew of nine of the Nova Scotia concrete schooner, Permenonola, arrived in St. John, N.B., yesterday after abandoning their vessel which stranded on Platte Point on Sunday morning. The vessel is owned in Sydney, N. S.

Premier Eduardo Dato of Spain was assassinated in Madrid last evening while returning from the chamber in a motor car. The chauffeur was also killed. The premier was about sixty-two years of age and the leader of the Liberal Conservative party in Spain.

Grand Falls, March 8.—Typhoid fever is very prevalent here, and is spreading. Each week adds new names to the list of those stricken.

TROUBLE AMONG SIKHS IN INDIA REPORTED

Delhi, India, March 9.—Great excitement is reported to prevail among the Sikhs as a result of a riot last month

between Sikh merchants and Sikh pilgrims, at Nankana, the famous Sikh shrine in the Punjab, in which many persons were killed. The Sikhs are said to be flocking into the town with the Hindus and Mohammedans are leaving it in terror. Reliable information is difficult to obtain, owing to the wild statements in circulation and the prevailing unrest.

PINKNEY AMONGST CATTLE IN MIDDLESEX TOWNSHIP

Ingersoll, March 9.—What has been diagnosed by veterinarians as influenza has broken out in epidemic form amongst cattle in several districts in North Dorchester Township, within a radius of ten miles of Dorchester. The outbreak has assumed a serious aspect as up to Saturday there had been two fatal cases. The complications include pneumonia, lung fever, spinal meningitis and pinkney. There has been a marked increase in the number of cases during the last few days.

W. C. Milner of the dominion department, at interesting address last evening before the Natural History Society. He dealt with the difficulties in the way of the collectors of historical records, and told of valuable records being used for curl papers. FINE RECEPTION FOR HON. D. W. MERSEREAU

Fredericton, March 8.—The official opening of the 44th annual convention of the Farmers' and Dairywomen's Association of New Brunswick took place tonight in the assembly hall of the normal school. President H. H. Magee, delivered his address and Mayor Reid, of Fredericton, officially welcomed the visitors. Vice-President A. J. Gaudet responded to Mayor Reid who rather surprised the French-speaking delegates by speaking briefly in French. His worship came originally from Cookshire in the Eastern Townships of Quebec and to quite an extent is bilingual.

Hon. D. W. Mersereau, minister of agriculture, received a rousing reception from the convention and his brief address was to the point. His statement that he did not expect the farmers to come to him but was ready to go to the farmers caused a great outburst of applause.

Bee-keeping, clover culture and the value of lime in farming were taken up in the afternoon session.

L. T. Floyd, provincial apiarist, said that within the last six years the foundation of a bee-keeping industry had been laid in New Brunswick. Bees were kept in some countries, he said, to assist in the pollination of cucumbers, tomatoes, etc. They could be used with advantage to clover crops. The roots of bee-keeping were small and the returns large, he said. Young people could do well with them.

O. C. Hicks of the New Brunswick department of agriculture said that more limestone at a cheaper price would be used in 1921 than in any previous year. Clover seed was at pre-war prices and these two facts should react on each other with mutual benefit, for lime and clover go together.

E. M. Taylor of the dominion experimental farm at Fredericton said that the principles relating to the correction of soil were becoming much better understood and, put into practice, The

lime requirements of the soil in different parts of the province carried, he said, but the average requirement was about 5,000 to 6,000 pounds an acre. Absence of lime caused sour soil. Mussel mud from the deposits at the mouths of tidal rivers possessed value as a sweetener of the soil.

The French section of the convention went into session at 4 o'clock. Hon. P. J. Veniot was the chief speaker. He spoke on agricultural affairs in general. Arthur J. Gaudet, representing the federal department of agriculture also addressed the French delegates.

SUMMER TOURIST FARES IN EFFECT JUNE 1

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CANADIAN CHAMBER OF COMMERCE IN THE BRITISH CAPITAL PLANNED

London, March 9.—British and Canadian business men have decided to form a Canadian Chamber of Commerce in London with the object of increasing trade with Canada. F. C. Wade, agent-general for British Columbia, who presided at a meeting of business men yesterday said the great question to be determined was whether Canada was to remain a British country or to be lost to Great Britain owing to the influence of United States money.
