GLORIOUS SINGERS IN OPERA HOUSE

Hollinshead and Madame James-Kennedy Give Rich Musical Treat
The reputation of Redferne Hollinshead as the greatest tenor in Canada and one who will rank among the greatest in the world was firmly established in the opinion of local music lovers who were privileged to hear him in last night's concert in the Opera House. Much has been claimed for him and those who heard him were quite willing to grant that he had sustained the reputation which had preceded him. His voice is one of great range and volume and of exceptional clearness and sweetness. Careful training has given him perfect control and expression and his rendition of the various numbers was such as to cause the utmost enthusiasm. The Opera House was filled with a large audience which was prepared to be critical but whose attitude was speedily turned to admiration.

Madame Lenora James-Kennedy who assisted and who took an almost equally prominent part in the concert was also received with great acclaim. She has a beautiful soprano voice and like her husband of great flexibility which gave the utmost pleasure to the audience.
The programme was a regularly well chosen and included a wide range from classical to modern selections. The enthusiasm of the audience led to demands for more encores than might reasonably be expected but the artist was generous and the happily chosen encores added not a little to the attractiveness of the concert.

In such a concert it is difficult to discriminate but among the most popular of Mr. Hollinshead's numbers no mention can be made of the Chelida Mania from La Boheme and La Donna e Mobile from Rigoletto. Among Madame James-Kennedy's greatest successes were the aria from Romeo and Juliet and the songs When Roses Bloom and Will-the-Wisp. The final duet, Miserere and the Prison Scene from Il Trovatore was beautifully rendered and made a fitting conclusion to the evening's most enjoyable concert heard in St. John in many years.
An incident which caught the fancy of the audience occurred when the lights inadvertently went out in the midst of one of Mr. Hollinshead's numbers. He paused the singer continued and the accompaniment followed. Their mastery of the situation was met with a great outburst of applause.
James S. Ford acted as accompanist in a most acceptable manner. No mention of the concert would be complete without giving credit to the Misses Lagin through whose efforts it was arranged and to whom the people of St. John are indebted for such a musical treat.

COMMON COUNCIL

The Matter of Grants by the City—City Engineer Submits Report

At the weekly meeting of the common council yesterday afternoon the report of the City Engineer on the matter of grants for the year was completed. The programme for water main renewal, the purchase of the city of the water and sewerage and public works was approved.
The following grants were approved:

Free Kindergarten Association 350

Arboricultural Society 500
The grant of \$200 to the Arboricultural Society is to be spent for the planting of trees in different parts of the city.
The application of the Salvation Army to the Sisters of the Good Shepherd and the St. John Art Club for grants was not completed. In connection with these grants, Commissioner Schofield said: "The question of civic grants to religious institutions is one that requires very careful consideration. The Salvation Army has been receiving \$800 from the city for the past few years. It is a very good work that has been done by the home. He also referred to statements made by the county secretary in regard to the placing of children who had no one to care for them, and how much easier it was to place them in the Catholic home than in the Protestant home. The county secretary was quoted as saying that children would starve if they had to wait for the arrangements which were to allow them to enter the Protestant Orphan's Home, while the Catholic institution took the children without asking questions.
The reports of the commissioners were then dealt with. The commissioner of public works was authorized to purchase one hot mixer, three eight and ten ton rollers, portable stone crusher, sand screener and oil distributor and to make arrangements for the purchase of a motor truck, to call for tenders for 125 tons of refined asphalt, fifty barrels of readium oil, 100 barrels of red oil, four tank cars of asphalt road oil, ten cords of hardwood, seventy-five tons of run of mine coal and to purchase 24 barrels of tar.
The commissioner of harbors was authorized to negotiate with the department of marine and fisheries regarding the grant of a portion of Middle street, W. E. for which the department has made a deed.
The controller was authorized to pay \$2,239.54 to the C. P. R. for repairs made to the railway tracks at Sand Point.
The commissioner of water and sewerage was authorized to proceed with his extensive programme of renewal of water mains on both sides of the harbor, to purchase a quantity of terra cotta pipe and to call for tenders for ten cords of oak, stop-cocks, valves, 200 barrels of cement, etc.
The report of the city engineer was received, and referred to the commissioners of public works and harbors, ferries and public lands. The engineer in his report
