MR. LONG, BOSTON HARBOR EXPERT, IS HAVING BUSY DAY

H. C. Long, a Boston expert on harbor matters, who is in St. John seeking information regarding port conditions here, is spending a busy day. He had a conference this morning with the mayor and several aldermen, another with City Engineer Murdoch and another with J. N. Macmillan, district engineer of the public works department. For this afternoon a trip around the harbor in a tug boat is planned.

St. John has been handicapped by two misconceptions, which have been spread broadcast and which are better known than are the advantages of the port, said Mr. Long to a Times reporter this morning. "The first of these arises from the statement which appears in all the newspapers that there is a sixty foot rise and fall of tides in the Bay of Fundy. As St. John is on the Bay of Fundy it is taken for granted that the tides here vary to that extent instead of only twenty feet, and so a transportation man this would look an unreasonably difficult in handling large quantities of business."

The other is the prevalent impression that because fog is a source of trouble around the Straits of Belle Isle and other parts of the eastern coast, that the same applies to St. John, and that the harbor can be entered only by the use of submarine signals or the aid of Providence.

I have met the secretary and I wish to say that in my opinion the harbor is a valuable asset. He has the right idea of the possibilities of harbor of trade work, and it seems to be a business in carrying out these ideas."

Speaking of the future of this port, Mr. Long did not hesitate to predict a great development which he said, would be made necessary by the growth of coast-ery traffic. He said the western crops would require 200,000 cars next year, and as there are only 70,000 in Canada, the rest will be plenty for American ports after the Canadian ports are given all they can handle.

MORE LIKE THE END OF COAL STRIKE

London, March 20—Preparations are already being made in most of the Yorkshire collieries for a resumption of work on Monday. Some of the men are even anxious to resume today.

Considerable numbers of miners have already resumed work in some of the Scottish coal fields. These however, are non-unionists, and there is trouble threatening them from assaults by the trades unionists. There appears to be a fairly augmenting desire in the whole of the coal fields of the United Kingdom to a settlement.

Fresh trouble, however, is threatened today, the colliery surface men's federation have notified the members of the labor party in the house of commons that unless the minimum wage bill provides also a fixed minimum for the surface men, the dispute will not be settled.

Berlin, March 20—The strike in the Westphalian coal fields is ended.
