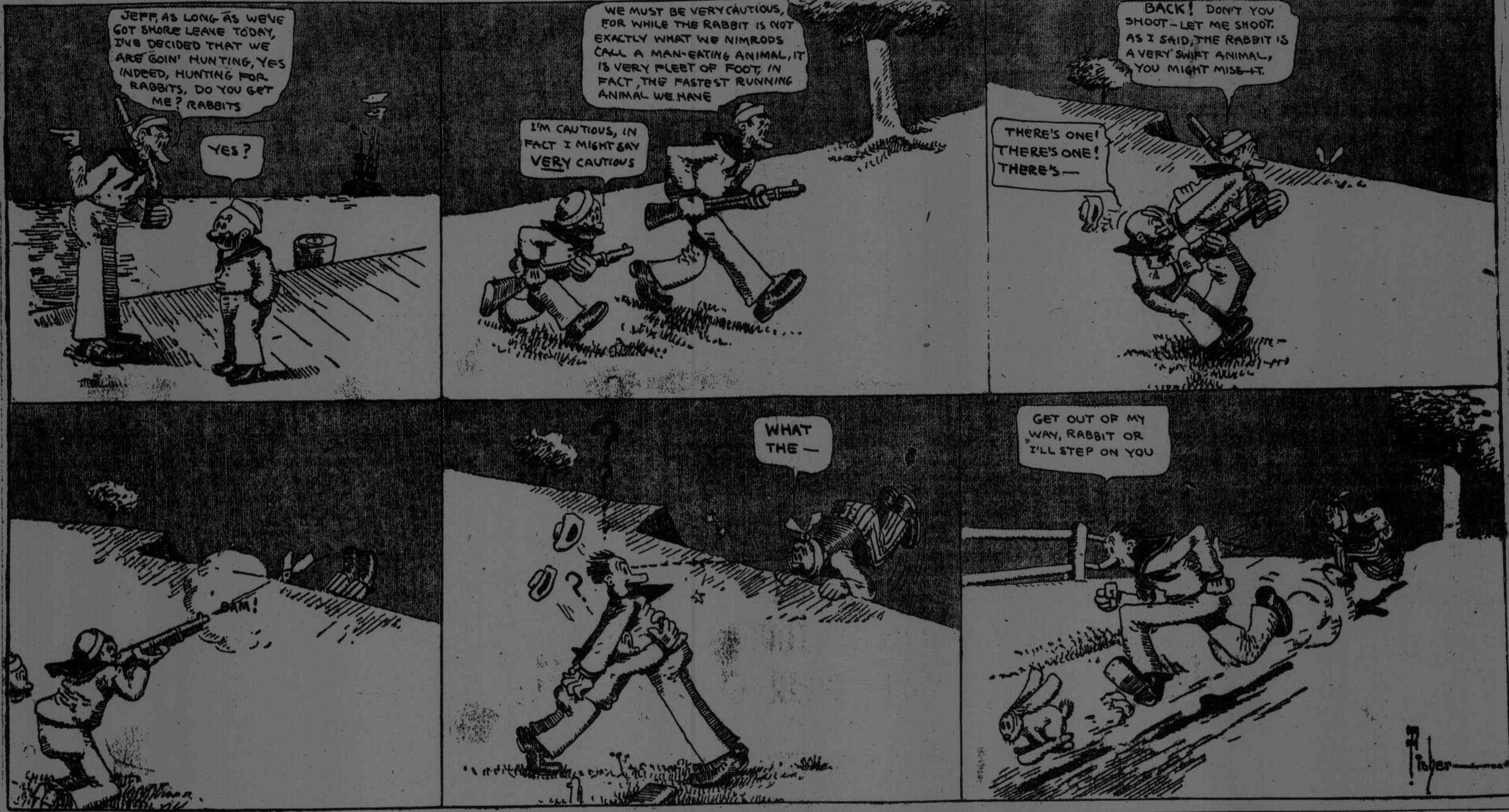

BEAUTIFUL YOUNG WIFE AS PRIZE IN LOTTERY She Does Not Have to Accept Winner, However, in Which Case he Gets Cash

St. Petersburg, June 13—A remarkable bachelors' lottery is being organized at Simolensk. The prize is a beautiful young wife, and 5,000 tickets at half a crown each are being sold. Not every one who pays half a crown can, however, hope to win the bride. She is to be "home" every day for a week to the ticket-holders, and after interviewing them, if she does not approve of some candidate as a possible husband, his money is to be refunded to him and the ticket withdrawn.

Another stipulation of the scheme is that when the winner eventually comes to claim his bride, he may yet be rejected by her, but receives by way of compensation half the sum of the total proceeds from the sale of the tickets. The drawing of the lottery, which has been sanctioned by the authorities, will take place soon.

FROM LONDON TO INDIA BY AIR ROUTE

Ambitious Scheme is Being Worked Out for Next September and is Believed Feasible. London, June 13—From London to India by air is the daring scheme which it is proposed to carry out this year. An advisory council has been formed in London for the purpose of making the necessary preliminary arrangements. Ernest Esdaile, a prominent Anglo-Indian, is acting as secretary.

It is expected that at least three British aviators will participate in the attempt. "The feat," said Mr. Esdaile, "is not as impossible as it appears, and I say with confidence that the flight will be accomplished this year."

"From Constantinople the Abatolia railway will be followed to Bozanti, and the route afterwards lies by way of Taurus, Adana, Aleppo, Bagdad, the Euphrates, and Tigris, to Bushire, along the coast of the Persian Gulf, of Bundera Abbas, and thence along the Arabian Sea to Karachi, which is the first point that can be touched in India."

"The distance, roughly speaking, is about 4,500 miles. Some time before the flight takes place we shall establish posts and petrol stations. I am going over the route myself by motor-car to make the necessary arrangements."

"I have spoken to a number of British aviators on the subject, and I have got quite as many as I require at the moment. We want the whole thing to be all-British, the machines as well."

"It is impossible to say how long the flight may take, but a start will not be made until after the monsoon season is over at the end of September. We mean to leave nothing whatever to chance."

"MANUFACTURED" PRECIOUS STONES

German Jewelry Trade Asking Government to Protect the Public. Berlin, June 13—The German jewelry trade has petitioned the government to take legal steps to protect the public against the corrupt sale of artificial or "synthetic" precious stones, principally rubies and sapphires.

It is admitted that the production of these "gems" by chemical processes has now been perfected to such a degree that none but the most expert eye can distinguish them from natural stones. Some of the finest synthetic stones produced are said to be those manufactured under a process invented by Professor Miethe, mineralogist of Charlottenburg Technical College at Berlin.
