"Since January 1, 1220, federal, provincial and municipal governments have disbursed approximately \$3,500,000 in unemployment relief to needy people. Greater need and greater de mands are in sight," said the minister of labor. "If every Canadian would buy only Canadian goods where available, volume productive and selling prices, absorb labor and eleminate or reduce to a minimum both the cost and necessity of relief measures. Canadian industries, woords show, continued to show, substantial decreases in the number of men employed. As compared with mid-winter of 1920, the situation is such as to demand attention and action.

Normally there are slock periods to many seasonal occupations, the minimum number of people being employed during midwinter. A true idea of the existing situation may be drawn from the fact that in January, 1920. 3,242 firms engaged in fourteen different lines of manufacture employed 395,290 workmen, while in July, 1921, these same firms had only 319,710 on their payrolls, a decrease of 73,380 or 19 per cent., at a season when normally their staffs are substantially increased over winter levels. Ninety lumbering firms reported 18,802 men employed in January, 1920, with but 6,656 in July, 1921, a decrease of 65 per cent., notwith-
