WATER SYSTEM IN OAK BAY

MAY NOT BE PUT IN AS LOCAL IMPROVEMENT

Difficulties Are Encountered by Council in Carrying Out Plans.

(From Thursday's Daily.) The assessed value of the land in the municipality of Oak Bay is placed at \$1,964,286.

For revenue purposes this is not quite all available as the "Chinese cemetery" and the city property in the council chamber have been decided last night at a meeting of the Oak Bay council.

On the report of the water committee being presented to the council telling of the cost of the water to one of a new redistribution scheme which would be paid for by the whole community instead of being done, as at first proposed, on the local improvement system, Councillor Pemberton objected to the plan, which he said was a wholly different scheme to what it had been the understanding would be introduced. He thought it was not fair to ask the whole community to pay for the supplying of water to one or two people who were a long distance away from all others.

In answer to this it was explained that practically all the council had been of one opinion, but it was found that any other plan was wholly unworkable. If, however, Mr. Pemberton had some scheme to propose, it would be for the council to consider it.

Councillor Newton explained that it was about a mile from the city. Aldermen Dier and Haworth spent the afternoon locating a suitable site for the new electric light plant for the city.

The Trades and Labor Council held its regular meeting last evening with President Waters in the chair. A feature of the meeting was a report from the hall committee, when it was reported that the rooms were practically used all the time, with the result that the building was proving a financial success.

The committee strongly emphasized that appreciation of the labor unions should be shown to Thomas Gough, of the Empire Cigar Store, who had for years voluntarily acted as agent for the renting of the hall, in which respect his services have been most valuable. The report of the committee was adopted and a vote of thanks passed to Mr. Gough, the secretary being instructed to convey the same to him under seal of the council. It was decided to accompany the letter with a token of appreciation.

An amusing incident connected with the building came up at the meeting. The delegates from the Carpenters' Union asked for an explanation about the Chinaman that was caught cleaning the Labor hall windows one day last week. Quite a lot of laughter and indignation was created among the delegates. Ultimately it was explained to have been a mistake. The Chinaman was hired to clean the windows of some hall on Douglas street. He got mixed in his geography and finding the door of Labor hall open entered, and in the absence of the caretaker, commenced to clean the windows until a few indignant union men arrived on the scene and ran him out.

O. R. Leatherbarrow presented his credentials as a delegate from the Cooks and Waiters' union, in place of C. H. Chamberlain, who resigned. The secretary of the Bartenders' Union wrote saying that his union had decided to withdraw from Labor Council. No reason was assigned for the action and the secretary was instructed to write asking for an explanation.

A letter was received from the headquarters of the American Federation of Labor thanking the council for a \$25 donation to the Gomer's defence fund. Frank H. Eaton wrote enclosing subscription lists which the secretary was instructed to pass to the council for a fund.

The secretary was instructed to write the city council asking what had become of the fair wage schedule that all the candidates for aldermen had so heartily endorsed, and promised to have embodied in a by-law. Nothing had been done so far and the delegates expressed their indignation in pretty strong language.

The secretary was also instructed to ask the school board what they had done or were going to do about similar promises and the same resolutions.

PIONEER OF DISTRICT DIED LAST EVENING

Henry Price Passed Away After Lingered Illness.

(From Thursday's Daily.) The death occurred last evening at St. Joseph's hospital of Henry Price, an old time resident of this district, who passed away after a lingering illness. Deceased was 72 years of age. He had been ill for months, and the end was not unexpected.

The late Mr. Price was born in County Armagh, Ireland. For a number of years after coming here he resided at Parson's Bridge at the head of Esquamet harbor, where he was known to all the country side. The remains have been removed to the chapel of the B. C. Funeral Furnishing Company, Government street, from which place the funeral will take place on Saturday, the remains being interred in the family lot at Ross Bay. Rev. Baugh Allen will officiate.

The late Mr. Price was highly respected by all who knew him, and his friendship was highly valued.

MANY HOUSES WRECKED

Tidal Wave Causes Heavy Losses on Islands of Morea and Rio Toonga.

San Francisco, April 7.—News of a severe tidal wave which wrought great damage to the islands of Morea and Toonga, near Tahiti, was brought here by Ivan C. McIndoo, of Fresno, Cal., who returned to-day on the steamship Mariposa from a visit to Tahiti. According to McIndoo's story the wave occurred either March 15th or 16th and although no damage is done to Tahiti, numerous houses were demolished and plantations devastated on other islands. The extent of the damage in Rio Toonga alone is estimated at about \$30,000. The gigantic wave came in with great velocity and swamped the land. Hundreds of small shacks and the dwellings of the natives were demolished, "so far as I could learn," said McIndoo, "there were no lives lost, although thousands of dollars damage and was done to both islands which lie but a few miles from Tahiti."
