Article 17 refers to the preceding articles which deal solely with the protection of the lives and property of foreigners residing in Morocco. Therefore article 17 gives the powers equal treatment concerning the protection of lives and pro perty, but does not recognize the German claim that the powers agreed to exercise equal political control of Morocco.
