for the year ending November 30, 1906, was issued this afternoon. It shows net profits of \$1.74,125 for twelve months, which is 17.41 per cent. on the paid up capital of \$10,000,000. Dividends of 7 per cent. and the bonus of one per cent. absorbed \$800,000, the sum of \$34,434 was written off bank premises, \$30,000 was transferred to the pension fund and \$25,000 to the San Francisco relief fund. After this \$500,000 was added to the rest, bringing that account up to \$5,000,000, or one half the paid up capital. A balance of \$103,502 was carried forward as compared with \$58,871 brought forward a year ago.
