FIRES AT GRAND MANAN.

Dwellings and Barns Carried Off by Flames.

Grand Manan has suffered greatly from fire lately.

In the woods back of Castella, a brush fire carelessly left led to quite an extensive conflagration, which destroyed not only a large stretch of woods but also two dwellings and a number of barns, besides fences and the like. Alden Griffin, who lives on the back road, lost his dwelling and barn and almost their entire contents. His neighbor, William Boynton, also lost his dwelling and barn but he was able to save some of their contents.

At Grand Harbor, a spark set fire to

a pile of edgings alongside the Sawyer mill. About 300 cords were destroyed. Fortunately the fire did not reach the lumber pile, otherwise the loss would have been a heavy one.

GIRL SNEEZED AND BACKBONE CRACKED

Miss Maud Warrington Victim of Peculiar Accident—The Nerve System Affected.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 19.—Miss Maud Warrington, No. 138 Fifth street, sneezed her backbone out of joint last Monday.

She dislocated the lumbar vertebrae by the violence of her sneeze, and heard the joint pop out of position.

It was just a simple, every-day sort of sneeze that did the damage, a sneeze that should have been bidden enjoyable, but it has kept Miss Warrington in a state of excessive pain for three days, and has made her very much afraid of indulging again in what has proved such an expensive luxury.

As the titillation of the sneeze reached its emphatic degree, Miss Warrington was convulsed for a moment by the effort, and as she, her-her-her-sneezed, she heard a sharp snap about her person, and the next instant was overwhelmed with pain and realized that something serious had happened in her spinal column.

She became prostrated at once and could hardly summon help. Aid was sent for to the California hospital, and a physician, after a hasty examination, saw the trouble, and by a painful but not serious process replaced the rebellious vertebrae. The young woman is now said to be all right, but was advised to avoid catching any more influenza.

Medical men generally say that this is the first instance of a sneeze producing such a serious result. Dislocations of the vertebrae are not at all common in medical practice, occurring only occasionally from violent causes.

Miss Warrington, who is a very pretty young woman, is now entirely recovered, but her suffering until the dislocation was corrected was agonizing, as it affected her entire nervous system and especially the acutely susceptible sciatic nerve. The pain was described as being as intense in every portion of her body as it was at the seat of the injury, and her endurance would have been exhausted if proper aid had not been provided just when it was.

PROMINENT NEW YORKER KILLED BY ROBBERS

NEW YORK, June 19.—That robbery was the motive for the murder of Julius T. Rosenheimer, president of the London Needle Company, who was killed Tuesday night while strolling about his estate in Pelham with his wife, is the belief of Sheriff Lane, Coroner Weisenburger and the detectives, who are working on the case. Upon an examination of the clothing of the dead man it was found that his watch and money were gone. A teamster was also robbed near the spot where the murder was committed ten minutes before the millionaire met his death.

BANK OF ENGLAND.

LONDON, June 20.—The weekly statement of the Bank of England shows the following changes. Total reserve increased £800,000; Circulation decreased £15,000; Bullion increased £84,000; other securities increased £400,000; other deposits increased £5,000; public deposits increased £1,064,000; notes reserve increased £175,000. Government securities unchanged. Proportion of the bank's reserve to liability this week is 47.30 per cent, as compared with 46.95 per cent. last week.

PREMIER BOND IS STANDING ON HIS DIGNITY

LONDON, June 19.—Premier Bond, of Newfoundland was interviewed today with reference to the proposal made by the foreign secretary, Sir Edward Grey, to Secretary Root for a settlement of the Newfoundland fisheries dispute. The premier said that he must assume that such proposal had not been formally submitted to the Washington government while negotiations still were being carried on with him. He declined to say whether similar proposals had been submitted to him but declared that such proposals could only receive a positive and emphatic refusal from his government.

"If the modus vivendi of 1906 was so objectionable that the Newfoundland government declined to be a party to it and refused to enforce it," he said, "how

could I, on behalf of this government, consent to its renewal with an additional clause setting aside the international law by preventing the service of a process on board American vessels."

In reply to further questions concerning the possibility of strained relations arising with the United States, Premier Bond emphatically declined to consider the possibility of war with that country. He said it would be the calamity of the age, adding: "Self-respect is the surest road to peace and no country appreciates self-respect more than the United States or regards people who sacrifice it with more contempt."
