

BRESNAHAN SETTLES HIS LAW ACTION

St. Louis, Jan. 4.—The claim of Roger Bresnahan, former manager of the St. Louis National League Baseball Club, against Mrs. Helen Britton, owner of the club, was compromised today. Parties to the compromise will not give out the figures, but it is reported that Bresnahan will be paid \$25,000 for a complete cancellation of what claim he might have had against Mrs. Britton for alleged violation of the contract by which he was to manage the club for five years.

RESULTS OF THE HOCKEY SATURDAY

Montreal, Jan. 5.—Outplaying the Canadiens to start to finish, Ottawa had little trouble in defeating the Frenchmen in a most decisive manner before a capacity audience at the Arena on Saturday, by a score of 7 to 3.

There was never any doubt as to which was the better team. From the commencement of play the Capitals started in with a rush, keeping the Canadiens on the defensive at almost all stages. They showed superior condition by setting a killing pace in the first 30 minutes, that took the French players off their feet, and at the call of time most of the locals showed signs of being all in.

There was no excuse to be offered as the ice conditions were favorable, and although there was only one goal scored in the opening period, it was the clever work of the goalkeepers that kept the score down.

During the play Pitre took a wallop at Broadbent and drew a second major fine which ruled him off for 20 minutes.

Tecumseh Defeats Quebec.

Quebec, Jan. 5.—On Saturday evening the Tecumseh hockey team from Toronto, defeated the Quebec aggregation by a score of 5 to 3, and that gives a fair idea of the play of the teams.

The Tecumsehs came here with a record of losing only two matches they had played this season, while on the other hand Quebec had defeated both the teams it met since the season opened, and one of these teams had proved victorious over the Tecumsehs. The supporters of the champions felt confident that the men from the west would go down to defeat last evening.
