"BOOTLEGGERS" FINED
\$100 ON EACH CASE

In the police court yesterday after-
noon Archie Green pleaded guilty to
the illegal sale of liquor on Saturday
evening, the 3rd inst., while Roy Foster
pleaded guilty to illegal sale of
liquor on Saturday the 3rd and Sun-
day the 4th. E. S. Ritchey represent-
ed both prisoners. A special officer
named Wilfred W. Jones gave evi-
dence of purchasing liquor from the
both defendants. Mr. Ritchey, on be-
half of the prisoners, asked that the
maximum fine be not imposed. The
Magistrate, however, did not accede
to the request and fined Green one
hundred dollars, and in default of pay-
ment three months in jail. Foster
was fined one hundred dollars and
three months in jail on each case.

It has been stated that "bootleg-
gers" throughout the city are all well
acquainted with the policemen and
the specials, but in the above cases ap-
pearing before the court one of the Green
and Foster. Jones had formerly been
a member of the 26th, and when he
purchased the liquor he was attired
in a uniform and was not suspected
of being a policeman.

ROTARY CLUB HEARS
ABOUT THE TORPEDO

Many members at lunch-
eon—Good address by Mr.
Punter.

The Rotary Club met at Bond's res-
taurant last evening, H. L. Gantner pre-
siding. Many members were present
at the luncheon, and the address given
afterwards by F. J. Punter on the con-
struction and methods of using the
torpedo in warfare was much appre-
ciated. Mr. Punter showed, in convinc-
ing fashion by means of sketches, the
usefulness of the torpedo in naval war-
fare. The method of starting the tor-
pedo, the action of the gyroscope in
connection with controlling the direc-
tion of the torpedo when discharged
either from the surface of the water
or below was explained in detail. Mr.
Punter referred to the methods em-
ployed in calculating the speed of the
torpedo as against the speed of the

Two and Part Three, in the name of
the Minister of Inland Revenue.
4. The amount of all such penalties
shall, except as herein otherwise
provided, belong to His Majesty for
the public uses of Canada and shall
form part of the Consolidated Revenue
Fund.
5. Any penalty collected and paid
under Part Three may be divided with
the person laying an information or
otherwise adding in effecting the con-
viction of the person accused, in such
proportions as the Treasury Board in
any case or class of cases directs and
appoints.

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
