LECTURE ON RUSSIA.

Russia was the subject of a very interesting picture talk by Miss Madeleine de Soyres in the museum yesterday afternoon, under the auspices of the Ladies' Association of the Natural History Society. The closing lecture in this free course will be on Roumania and will be given on the last Thursday in March.

Miss de Soyres traced the history of Russia from earliest times through centuries of struggle against their bitter enemies, the Tartars, who were incessantly attacking the Russians, devastating their fields and burning their wooden cities. Only a race of extraordinary vitality and tenacity could have survived what they suffered. It was not until comparatively recent times that Russia has been recognized as one of the greatest of European nations, but for achievements in music, literature, sculpture and painting during the past century few people excel the Russians.

Miss de Soyres' paper was enhanced by extracts from a lecture delivered by the late Rev. John de Soyres on his stay in Russia as chaplain to the British embassy, describing his journey to that country and his first impressions of St. Petersburg.

The lecture was illustrated by a splendid series of retrospective pictures showing many of Russia's magnificent buildings as well as scenes in the military camps during the present war.

Give the Women More Money

In its last annual report the provincial department of agriculture pays itself on the back because of what it has done towards the development of home economic societies, says The Winnipeg Telegram.

However, that the government's exertions in this direction have really been very small and not at all commensurate with the importance of the subject.

These women's organizations have been doing a great deal for the amelioration of living conditions, especially in rural districts. The training they give is of the utmost value in helping to make the homes of the people more comfortable and more attractive.

There is no work upon which public funds can be more advantageously expended. And for the fiscal year ending next month the total sum set apart for this purpose was only \$10,000. It is not nearly enough. This money is taken out of the great sum of \$25,000,000 which the province has for agricultural purposes. Why shouldn't the women have the whole sum? They could make good use of it.

The fact is that neither the government nor the women have yet awakened fully to the implications involved in giving votes to women. It will presently develop that whereas they formerly had to ask, almost to beg,
