## COUNTY W. C. T. U.

HEAR THREE GOOD  
ADDRESSES YESTERDAY

Convention Held in Fairville Baptist Church — Reports Heard From Three Local Unions, Showing Splendid Work.

The St. John County W. C. T. U. convention was held in the Fairville Baptist church under the auspices of the Fairville Branch of the W. C. T. U., Mrs. R. D. Christie, president, in the chair.

Mrs. M. Seymour, evangelistic superintendent, led in the devotional service, taking as her subject, Prayer. Mrs. Seymour gave a very interesting Bible reading from the 14th chapter of St. John's Gospel. After the hymn "Blest Be the Tie That Binds," was sung, several members offered prayer.

Mrs. Christie then opened the business session, and after the minutes of previous session were read and approved Rev. J. W. Williamson addressed the meeting. Mr. Williamson gave a very interesting talk on the letters W. C. T. U. First letter V. We Wage War on Wickedness; 2nd, C. Call Children to Christ; 3rd, T. Teach them Truth and Temperance; 4th, U. Utter a United Ultimatum on the forces of Wickedness.

Mrs. Williamson pointed out women's work along these lines and said that great credit was due the women for what had been accomplished. The secretary then read reports from the three local unions. These reports showed that a splendid work was being done, the sick and shut-ins were being visited, and were cheered by gifts of flowers, fruit and delicacies; the various institutions of our city were being visited.

Mr. Marshall, secretary of the New Brunswick Alliance was present and gave a very interesting talk on the working out of the prohibitory law. Mr. Marshall stated that the temperance cause did not lack funds for the carrying on of the work; they were in good financial condition. Greetings were sent to all the temperance people of New Brunswick from Washington. The temperance people of Washington said they hoped the U. S. A. would soon be like Canada, bone dry.

Four young ladies then sang a selection very acceptably. Rev. Mr. Bishop, the new pastor of the Fairville Baptist church, was present and was welcomed to the convention by the president. Mr. Bishop in his address said the vote recorded in Massachusetts, U. S. A., was for national prohibition.

Rev. Mr. Townsend, pastor of the Presbyterian church, gave the greetings from his church and people to the convention and wish them God speed in the splendid work in which they were engaged.

The president in thanking these gentlemen for their attendance and addresses, said that the great desire of the W. C. T. U. was to have the clergymen present at the meetings and to have them co-operate with the Union.

A reading was given by Mrs. W. Linton, which was enjoyed by all present. Another selection was given by the four young ladies entitled "While I Sit at Home and Knit."

Mrs. Christie read a paper from the provincial president entitled "Train the Children."

An open discussion was then proceeded with, several members taking part. Meeting was brought to close by singing the hymn "For Our Valiant Soldiers Lord we Pray," and prayer was offered by Rev. Mr. Townsend.

The ladies then adjourned to the school room where supper was served by the ladies of Fairville union.

## Control Flea Beetles.

The small dark coloured "flea beetles," one twentieth to one-quarter of an inch in length, so-called from their habit of leaping or jumping, eat holes into the leaves of turnips, radishes, potatoes, tomatoes and other vegetables. They are most injurious in spring when the young seed leaves are often visited by large numbers of the insects and quickly destroyed.

## ANNUAL MEETING

Interesting Sessions and Helpful Talks Enjoyed — \$15,093.65 Raised During the Year.

At the 33rd annual meeting of the N. B. and P. E. L. branch of the Women's Missionary Society, held at St. Stephen, two important resolutions were placed before the delegates—one limiting the number of delegates to branch meetings, the other resolution emphasizing the importance of district meetings.

The branch is highly favored this year in having two missionaries present—Miss Hart, on her fourth furlough, and Miss Bird, on her first furlough, both from Japan.

At the first meeting the devotional services were led by Miss Hart and communion service conducted by the pastor, the Rev. H. S. D. Stothard.

At the evening session the Branch Circle and Band Secretary, Mrs. Humphrey, of Sussex, reported that the sum of \$5,238.55 was raised during the year, being an increase of \$524.78 over last year.

Miss Bird addressed the gathering, giving an account of the life of the women of Japan.

St. Stephen Circle gave a splendid exercise in costume, entitled "Voices of the Women," after which a beautiful duet was rendered.

At Wednesday morning's session the reports of district organizers were given, with every district but one showing a decided increase. Following these very encouraging reports the treasurer, Mrs. Clark, informed the gathering that the net amount raised for the year amounted to \$15,093.65, being an increase of \$1,230.97 over last year. This is the largest increase in many years.

There has been an increase in the membership in Circles and Bands, and a greater interest manifested along all lines of endeavor.

Devotional exercises of evening session conducted by Rev. H. S. D. Stothard after which very inspiring and interesting talks were given by Mrs. Sanford, president; and Miss Hart, returned missionary from Japan.

After solos by Mrs. Bains and Miss Nesbitt the benediction was pronounced by Rev. Mr. Malcolm.

The Red-headed Flea Beetle is destructive to potatoes and beans. Infested plants should be promptly sprayed with an arsenical mixture containing either Paris green or arsenate of lead, or with Bordeaux mixture alone. The latter acts as a deterrent.
