Convention Held in Fairville Baptist Church -- Reports Heard From Three Local Unions, Showing Splendid Work.

The St. John County W. C. T. U. convention was held in the Fairville Baptist church under the auspices of the Fairville Branch of the W. C. T. U.

Mrs. M. Seymour, evangelistic superintendent, led in the devotional service, taking as her subject, Prayer. Mrs. Seymour gave a very interesting Bible reading from the 14th chapter of St. John's Gospel.

Mrs. Christy then opened the business session, and after the minutes of previous session were read and approved Rev. J. W. Williamson addressed the meeting.

Mr. Marshall, secretary of the New Brunswick Alliance was present and gave a very interesting talk on the working out of the prohibition law.

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Four young ladies then sang a selection very acceptably. Rev. Mr. Bishop, the new pastor of the Fairville Baptist church, was present and welcomed to the convention by the president.

Another selection was given by the four young ladies entitled "While I Sit at Home and Knit."

Mrs. Christie read a paper from the provincial president entitled "Train the Children."

An open discussion was then proceeded with, several members taking part. Meeting was brought to close by singing the hymn "For Our Valiant Soldiers Lord we Pray, and prayer was offered by Rev. Mr. Townsend.

The ladies then adjourned to the school room where supper was served by the ladies of Fairville union.

Control Flea Beetles. The small dark coloured "flea beetles," one twentieth to one-quarter of an inch in length, so-called from their habit of leaping or jumping, eat holes into the leaves of turnips, radishes, potatoes, tomatoes and other vegetables. They are most injurious in spring when the young seed leaves are often visited by large numbers of the insects and quickly destroyed.

W. M. S. HOLD ANNUAL MEETING

Interesting Sessions and Helpful Talks Enjoyed -- \$15,093.65 Raised During the Year.

At the 33rd annual meeting of the N. B. and P. E. L. branch of the Women's Missionary Society, held at St. Stephen, two important resolutions were placed before the delegates--one limiting the number of delegates to branch meetings, the other resolution emphasizing the importance of district meetings.

The branch is highly favored this year in having two missionaries present--Miss Hart, on her fourth furlough, and Miss Bird, on her first furlough, both from Japan.

At the first meeting the devotional services were led by Miss Hart and communion service conducted by the pastor, the Rev. H. S. D. Strothard.

At the evening session the Branch Circle and Band Secretary, Mrs. Humphrey, of Sussex, reported that the sum of \$5,288.50 was raised during the year, being an increase of \$524.78 over last year.

Miss Bird addressed the gathering, giving an account of the life of the women of Japan.

At Wednesday morning's session the reports of district organizers were given, with every district but one showing a decided increase. Following these very encouraging reports the treasurer, Mrs. Clark, informed the gathering that the net amount raised for the year amounted to \$15,093.65, being an increase of \$1,230.97 over last year.

There has been an increase in the membership in Circles and Bands, and a greater interest manifested along all lines of endeavor.

At the Circle and Band conference in the afternoon many ideas were exchanged and many helpful suggestions given.

Devotional exercises of evening session conducted by Rev. H. S. D. Strothard after which very inspiring and interesting talks were given by Mrs. Sanford, president, and Miss Hart, returned missionary from Japan.

After solos by Mrs. Bains and Miss Nesbit the benediction was pronounced by Rev. Mr. Malcolm.

The Red-headed Flea Beetle is destructive to potatoes and beans. Infested plants should be promptly sprayed with an arsenical mixture containing either Paris green or arsenate of lead, or with Bordeaux mixture alone. The latter acts as a deterrent.

Y. W. P. A. WILL PICK STRAWBERRIES FOR PATRIOTIC FUNDS

Twenty-Two Members Volunteer for Summer Camp at Interesting Meeting Held Last Evening--Canning Demonstration Given.

Twenty-two girls volunteered for a summer camp at the meeting of the Young Women's Patriotic Association held in the Great War Veterans' Association rooms last evening.

The president, Miss Jessie Church, announced that she had been in communication with the department of agriculture for some time and that recently a letter had been received by her from a farmer living near Sackville who could give employment to between thirty and forty young women in the strawberry season.

Thirty-five thousand boxes of strawberries were raised on this farm last summer. The plan is that the wages these girls receive for the work shall be turned into the association funds, as owing to the scarcity of male help the berries would be lost unless women in the strawberry season.

It was decided to appoint the first meeting in October as the day for the talent money earned by the members to be brought in.

Members were asked to save bottles for the Seven Seas' sale in the fall. The musical comedy "Right-O" to be given by the Y. W. P. A. is postponed until the third week in September.

Miss Jessie Church was appointed to represent the association on the executive of the Social Service Conference, and the following were appointed as delegates: Miss McNeill, Miss Boyer, Miss Grady, Miss Bayard.

It was noted that flowers should be sent to Miss Irene Barbour, V. A. D., who is quarantined in the St. James street Military Hospital.

A will be held next week which will be thrown open to the public. It will be addressed by Miss Jones of Toronto in the Y. W. C. A. who will speak on summer camps for girls, and it is hoped to have members of all girls clubs in the city present.

Two offers of employment were received for the Y. W. P. A. members. The Fernhill Cemetery Directors offered to hire young women for such work as taking the paths and lots.

From a tonorial firm in the city an offer to train a young woman as a barber was received. The association declined both offers.

The treasurer's report was as follows:--General fund \$164.10; reserve fund, \$34.57; returned fund, \$86.10. The sum of \$285 was voted the Salvation Army Hut.

After the regular business of the meeting was concluded a most interesting demonstration of canning tomatoes was given by Miss Bertha Boyer.

NEW TAX FOR MOTION PICTURES TOMORROW

Word was received yesterday by the local theatre managers from the Department of Inland Revenue, that the tax imposed by the Dominion government on the exhibitors of pictures of fifteen cents per reel per day will go into effect the first day of June.

It is presumed that this tax will be collected through the agencies which supply the films.

Hamilton, Ont., May 29--Scoring "peace propaganda" as the most dangerous weapon in the hands of Germany, Bishop Clark, of the Niagara Anglican Synod today delivered an inspiring message of which the dominant note was "carry on."

"While Germany with her hands maddened and destroyed, with her voice she invites perjury. This is not the time to talk peace but to strive for victory," said His Lordship.
