Maine Had A Good
Racing Season

Harness Events in Which
Maritime Entries Participated
Were Marked by Close
Contests and Fast Time.

Bangor, Me., Nov. 5.—This has been a big season for harness racing in Maine, the land of half-mile tracks and country fairs. There have been approximately 100 days of racing and about 800 starters have gone some 700 heats, dividing about \$50,000 in purses, varying from \$50 to \$1,000. The time has been varied from the best mark, 2:02 1/2 to 3:10.

Dr. D. H. McAllister, of Bangor, N. B., raced a classy string and grabbed off something almost every time he started. W. B. Lind, of Fredrickton, N. B., was over the line on several occasions after some of the money, and there were others.

The premier Maine reinmen, Irving Pottle and Joe Johnson, had good luck generally. C. J. Worthen, of St. Albans, with his 15-year-old son, Doug Worthen, also had a good season, particularly with Charles W. Billy Cummins, driving the Hudson Farm string from Guilford, was a good money-winner.

Miss deSoyes brought before the members by request the matter of Harbor Commission and asked for a thorough study of the question so that voting might be intelligent. The treasurer, Miss Short, reported a balance on hand of \$1,126.

Miss Dodge gave a report of the catering for the Artillery dance.

Miss Matheson told of the proposed programme for classes and amusement at the newly purchased building on King street east and asked for volunteers to assist in the work of making it a social centre. Miss Brock reported that two Y. W. P. A. members have been asked to work on the Physical Classes committee.

Miss Dawson gave a delightful reading and Miss Bernice Jordan two pleasing songs after which refreshments were served at a social hour spent. Nearly forty pots of jam were brought for patients in the military hospitals. Miss Boyer and Miss Willett were in charge of the refreshments.
