Offers of Sites
For Big Fight

Nevada Silver Mining Camp
Guaranteed \$800,000—Half
Million Offer from London.

New York, March 28.—Two new offers of sites for the Dempsey-Carpenter heavyweight championship fight were made to promoter Tex Rickard today. One came from a Nevada mining camp and guaranteed the pugilist \$800,000 if he would stage the contest there on July 4. The other was presented by representatives of a London syndicate and included a half million dollar offer for the bout if it could be staged in Olympia during Derby week. Rickard took the offers under consideration and said that a final decision might be expected during the present week, unless unoward circumstances arose to delay his selection of the place of battle.

Rickard's intention, from authoritative sources, it was learned, however, that Rickard has no intention of staging the match in any isolated section of the country if a site close to the metropolis is available. The expense attendant upon a boxing bout of this calibre is so great that only a large centre of population to draw from would warrant the erection of an arena capable of seating the number of spectators necessary to pay for the purse involved. Reports were current today that the contest would be held in New Jersey and both Newark and Jersey City were named as probable sites for the arena. Rickard refused to deny or confirm the rumors and stated positively that he would not announce the place of combat, until he was absolutely assured that he could go through with the enterprise once he had started building the structure.

Rochester, N. Y., Mar. 28.—Referee Dick Nugent of Buffalo, stopped a scheduled fifteen round go between Irish Patsy Cline of Newark, and Cal Delaney of Cleveland, in the fifth round here tonight. Nugent claimed that Cline was stalling. Up to the time of the referee's decision Delaney had the better of the go, according to the newspaper critics.

Injury Prevented McGowan
Skating and Title Holder
Agreed to Postponement.

New York, Mar. 28.—An injury prevented Everett McGowan of St. Paul from competing in three deciding indoor professional speed skating races tonight with Norval Baptie of Bathgate, N. D., holder of the Canadian title. Each had won a race and Baptie, declining to win by forfeit, agreed to postpone the final mile race indefinitely.

After winning the 440 yard event in 1:14 seconds, McGowan tripped in the eighth lap of the half mile pursuit race, which Baptie won in one minute, 33 2-5 seconds. McGowan strained his back and was unable to continue.

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
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
