THE EASTERN WORLD'S NEWS WELL TOLD IN GERMAN LETTER.

Militarism on the Continent--Crispi's Death--Caucasian Tragedies and Romances--Remarkable Tale of Youthful Criminal in Germany--Macedonian Leader.

Jena in Thuringia, Aug. 18. Lieber M.--All that was earthly of Emperor Frederick has been laid to rest beside the remains of her "Mann" Frederick the Noble, at Potsdam. King Edward and Queen Alexandra, who have been attending the last rites of the late emperor, will remain for some time in Germany. Count Von Waldsee arrived in Hamburg last Sunday and was received by the Emperor and reported on the Chinese affair to Kaiser William. This recalls the fact that Baron von Kettler, who was widowed in China, was buried on Sunday at Muenster in Westphalia. The widow of the late minister and his mother attended the requiem mass in the old cathedral.

A Remarkable Case. A very remarkable case has just been completed before the court of Freiburg in Breisgau in which two school boys, aged 15 and 13, have been sentenced to two years, seven weeks and five days, respectively. The ringleader, whose surname was Karl, brought his first school year to a close with a bad report from the teacher of the "Terria" form. Through fear of his father he forged another. Knowing what the result would be, he was very anxious to return to school. Sometime before the end of the vacation in playing with a fellow scholar named Eugene, aged 13, he stated that he was not anxious to return to school and suggested that it would be a nice thing if the school were burned down. Eugene entertained the same opinion and Karl suggested that they perform the deed. Eugene entered the school in the afternoon, through a window, and endeavored to set the music room on fire. In the evening the fire had not come to hand Karl entered, and having poured petroleum about the room, set fire to the room and escaped. The fire did only a slight damage and the school opened on the date fixed. Karl did not turn up with the other scholars and apparently was not missed. But, in order to keep up appearances, he forged reports from the master and forged his father's censoring comments. More reports were sent from the printer in the name of his form-master, forged a receipt for his fees, stamped it with a stamp which had been engraved by an engraver, and, instead of sending the receipt to write letters to the head-master threatening that if the holidays were not extended the school would be blown up. In the meantime he stole money from a lady, a friend of the family, and sent an anonymous letter that the thief was a "school boy." He also forged orders for goods to manufacturing firms, using the names of local tradespeople which resulted in their receiving goods

which they had never ordered. Finally he and Eugene were arrested. They remained some time under the observation of Dr. Faticci, an expert psychologist, who stated that there was nothing in their conduct that would justify the assumption of abnormality and that the whole cause of the trouble was the influence of undesirable literature, especially the stories of Karl May. (These are blood and thunder dime novels.) Can your clever American boys beat this for a record?

Italy. The travesty men of Rome, Naples and Leghorn are on strike for better wages. There is no disorder of any kind, which is an exceptional thing in Italian strikes. Signor Domenico Morelli, Italy's greatest painter, died at Naples last Tuesday. There appears to be considerable excitement in Malta over the death of Mr. Chamberlain instructing the chief secretary of the government to tax the people by Order in Council. A public meeting was held last Sunday at which vigorous speeches were made by some of the principal members of the Council and prominent citizens. The crowd afterwards tore down a Union Jack and hoisted outside the Union Club, the national flag, the British Chronicle office. The fever heat which at present prevails will probably cool off and the people accept the inevitable, viz: the English language for Court purposes. The principal agitators are Italian clerics. The outrage which was committed upon the marble statue of the late Queen Victoria on Tuesday night is not calculated to help the cause of the agitators. Some corrosive acid was thrown on the figure and defaced it in several places.

Austria-Hungary. A few days ago a man was arrested in Trieste, named Joseph Tyrol as a spy. He had a kodak and sketches of the Austrian fortifications in his possession. He was an Italian by name and the master of a boat of diplomatic notes between the Austrian and Italian foreign offices. Another case of an officer attacking a civilian with his sword is reported from Hungary. Last Thursday Prince Joseph of Baganza and his friend, Lieutenant Count Halter, came to an inn, where they had other notes. The town was sitting. The prince soon went to bed while Count Halter remained. Suddenly Halter sprang up, drew his sword and struck violently at the mayor. The civilians seized the count and disarmed him. The affair has caused a sensation and has been reported to the government.

Peninsula. An important article in one of the Madrid papers, attributed to Senor Sili, has been published. The article related to deals with the question of Morocco and suggests a neutral country between France and Spain; France to receive the Spanish Presidio of Ceuta and Melilla and the fertile Atlantic coast. The Imperialists said that Spain should observe an attitude of strict neutrality toward her naval and military resources are placed on firm footing, but that she will be ready to abandon this attitude at the first sign of aggression.

Portugal is re-organizing its army and is apparently preparing for any international disturbance that may arise. The military manoeuvres will probably take place in combination with the English squadrons.

Crispi's Death. Last Sunday Crispi, after a long death struggle, breathed his last. He was in an unconscious state for some time before his death. The death of Crispi is regarded as one of the most picturesque figures from the European stage. During his long life he has been in turn revolutionist, partisan, conspirator and statesman. The history of Crispi's life is like a romance along political as well as social lines. The Sicilian revolt, his exile, Garibaldi's private secretary, his part in the premiership, the rumbling of marauds and retreat from public life are merely touching some of the incidents of his career. The Triple Alliance and the

Anglo-Italian entente are largely due to his influence. His romantic marriages are known to everyone. His two last wives survive him. The Italian press does much more for the deceased and, generally, an eloquent tribute is paid to him both as a patriot and as a statesman. The Avanti, a socialist newspaper, discovered the French press are very severe upon Crispi. The Avanti says: "Two things dominated Crispi's political career and influenced him in a disastrous way; first, his moderate ambition, which led him to take Bismarck for his model; secondly, his Gallophobia, which he never lost an occasion of manifesting." All the Parisian journals are similar in their criticism of the dead. They speak of him as "tyrant," "despot," "oppressor," "foe" from the Bismarckian side, etc., etc. The true reason of the wide severe criticism can be found in the fact that he was an Anglophile and one of the founders of the Triple Alliance and at the same time a Gallophobe.

Russia. The new Russian minister of education continues to mark his advent with fresh expressions of his views. Last week he denounced his action regarding Jews in the universities. This week he has ordered a number of German schools in the Baltic provinces to be closed on the ground that the local German school authorities have admitted Russian children. The measure is regarded as only another step towards the complete Russification of the Baltic provinces.

In Europe we are prone to forget that the manners and customs of the original tribesmen of the Caucasus have undergone very little change since the province came under Russian sway. The Caucasian still possesses a desire to obtain a wife by the force of his arms. The complete Russification of the Baltic provinces.

A fortnight ago a romantic tragedy was enacted here. A young noble of princely rank wished to marry a neighbor's daughter, who was his betrothed. Her parents, however, had made other arrangements for the girl. The rejected lover, still on friendly terms with the girl's relatives, invited the latter with their daughter, to a dinner party at his chateau. Late in the evening while the numerous guests were dancing and amusing themselves the young prince stole away with his sweetheart. The father of the girl, assisted by his retainers, gave chase and first day found the lovers in a forest just as the sun was setting and the girl taken home. In order to prevent any further escapades, and the chosen husband elect forgiving the previous flight, the marriage was arranged within 48 hours. The girl, an extremely handsome Mingolka, appeared for the wedding function cool and collected. He was acquitted because his conviction would have constituted a scandal and patron Prince Ferdinand. It is a great misfortune to Bulgaria and the Balkans that Samoff is a free man. 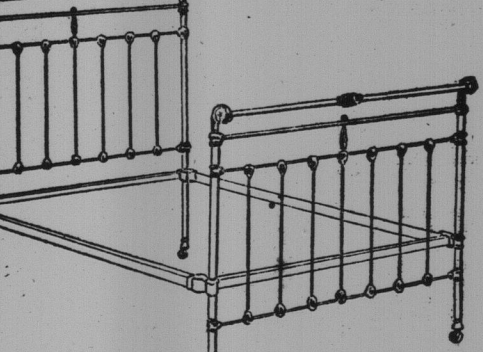

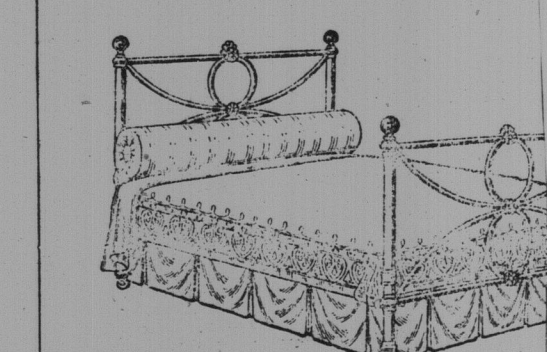

SHOT HIS FIFTEEN YEAR OLD SWEETHEART.

Parents Said She Was Too Young to Marry, He Became Enraged. Philadelphia, Aug. 31--Lucia Pasquale, aged 15 years, was shot and killed today by Carmine Pasquale, aged 25, who afterwards killed himself. Carmine and Lucia were sweethearts and the young man had frequently urged the girl to marry him. Her parents favored the suit, but Lucia's father, Frank Pasquale, an immigrant, objected to their daughter's marriage at such an early age. The girl told him to wait a few weeks. Her mother, however, drew a revolver and fired the fatal shot.

SWIMMER DROWNED, DAUGHTER ON HIS BACK.

Expert, Illustrating How to Carry Person in the Water, Lost His Life. New York, Sept. 1--Geo. Belcher, of Brooklyn, well-known as an expert and safety swimmer, was drowned at Broad Channel, Rockaway Beach, today. He was giving an exhibition in deep water of how a swimmer could carry a person on his back, and his daughter, Eva, 18 years old, was the one he carried. Hundreds of people were intently watching the two when Belcher and his daughter began to flounder in the water. The crowd thought this was a part of the exhibition and no one made a move to help until Belcher's wife who was among the spectators, began to scream that something was wrong. Both sank. Finally a man in the crowd rushed into the water and after diving, brought the girl to the surface. She was revived, but when her father's body was recovered, life was extinct.

GOVERNMENT STEAMER MINTO SUFFERS BY FIRE.

Ablaze at Charlottetown--Some Hundreds of Dollars Damaged--Oil Tank Explodes. Halifax, N. S., Sept. 1--(Special)--Fire occurred on the government steamer Minto at Charlottetown, P. E. I. this morning and caused damage amounting to several hundred dollars. It will delay her departure for Quebec a week or ten days. The fire started among some oily waste and was confined to the engine room and the damage was mostly to the woodwork, but the iron work about the room was also damaged, the iron being warped and paint burnt off. The engines are thought to have escaped injury. The engine room stores were all destroyed. Fresh fuel was added to the fire by the explosion of the oil tank.
