



TINNING IBON,-Cast-iron articles to be tinned, are first scoured bright with sulphuric acid and sand, then washed in clean warm water and dried. They are afterwards coated with zinc, and a coat of tin is put upon the top of the zinc, by dipping the aricles into moltin tin. When the tinning operation is finished the articles are placed in coiling water, and allowed to cool slowly.




