Taxes Still in Arrears.  
Tax arrears are still being collected by the Assessment Commission. The amount Mr. M. Huemmer, Commissioner, paid is about \$17,500 being due on unpaid land and buildings.

An interesting fact mentioned by the official who attended to the arrears is that some ratepayers are under the impression that the payment of the extra five per cent by them relieves them from paying the taxes or at least enables them to postpone the payment of the taxes. The contrary of this opinion was pointed out.

Stratford Citizen's Sudden Death  
Although in his usual health up till 6 o'clock Sunday night, Mr. Joseph J. Walsh, Stratford, was dead yesterday morning at 2 o'clock, so suddenly that his unexpected illness and death was a surprise to all who knew him.

He was one of the oldest and best known merchants in that city. He was an enthusiastic member of the Park Board, and was a faithful tenant of the late Mr. Geo. of his far-reaching plans for beautification of the city through its park-

Mr. Walsh was born in Toronto sixty-three years ago, and came to Stratford in 1882. He was with his brother Edward, entered into business, and took over the business of the late James Corcoran. They have been doing business continuously at the same stand since that time.

He is survived by one daughter and four sons.

Toronto Seat of Primat  
Whether Toronto or Ottawa is to be the seat of the Primat of All Canada is a question that was discussed by a sub-committee of the Board of Managers of the Church of England in Canada which met in Toronto last week-end. The question of bringing the Primat to the east where he would be in immediate touch with the centre of things is regarded as one of vital import to the ecclesiastical government.

Archbishop Matheson is at present located at Winnipeg being the cotemporary of the Bishop of Rupert Land, and it is thought that he should be relieved of his diocesan work that he might devote himself to the energies of the diocese.
