The game, which was packed with spills and thrills, was decided late in the third period, when a rare goal belated the UNB net deflected off "Knucker" Irvine's stick into the lower left hand corner of the net. Defeat UNB 7-6-A.A.H.A. Orders Game Replayed on Tuesday.

The Fredericton Dairy Kings defeated UNB Senior Varsity 7-6 in the third game for the York County Championship. The game was played under protest by UNB as Dairy Kings used Ben McLennan, who at the time was registered with the Fredericton Capitals. Despite a telegram reportedly received by Dairy Kings management, McLennan was played and consequently a replay of the game ordered. On the face of it, it would seem only that the Dairy Kings wanted to see a strong squad for the encounter; however this comes from the opinion that another \$5000 game was taken into consideration.

The Dairy Kings jumped into an early 4-1 lead in the 1st period as they were very slow, carved the players to fill their passes and the result at times proved disastrous to both teams. UNB closed the gap in the 2nd period but the Dairy Kings forged ahead again in the 3rd and were never headed.

Kenny Gordon, who pulled the "hat trick" and Arnie Dickenson, Dairy Kings brilliant players, were outstanding for the winners, while George Steele, playing perhaps his best game of the season, led the UNB into trouble.

For the past several years little has been known of the hockey team or its activities except its constant battle with the elements on an outdoor rink. Now we can all see them in action and follow their play in a spirit that is hockey's own.

The following is a brief outline of each player as the team stands:

- No. 1. "BIM MCINTYRE—Goalkeeper (5'8", 150 lbs.). Born in a Sophomore Civil and comes from Saint John. During the war he was with the R. C. A. F. overseas. In '46 he played with the Saint John Dry Dock Royals and last year with UNB. Also is Vice-President of the Engineering Society.
- No. 2. "TOM BALLANTYNE—Right Defence (6'2", 215 lbs.). Tom hails from Kapuskasing, Northern Ontario and is a Sophomore Forester. His hockey career to date includes Junior and Intermediate in the N.O.H.A. for the home town, Albert College in 1941-'42 before joining the RCAF, UNB 1947-'48. Tom also plays football, Intramural Basketball and loves to eat above all.
- No. 3. "ART PLUMMER—Left Defence (6'1", 190 lbs.). Art is another foggy city boy and is a Junior Fire-Medical student. Art played two years with Saint John High before joining the RCAF. While at Central he played Intermediate in the O.H.A. for the Air Force. This is Art's third year on Varsity defence and he has had three successful seasons with the football team. Art's interests include the Flying Club and Veteran's Club.
- No. 4. "GEORGE STEELE—Right Defence (5'11", 170 lbs.). George comes from that great family of golfers in Rothesay and is a Sophomore Civil. George's golf is rivaled only by his hockey having played three years while in High School and is a Hockey Player. Perhaps his success on defence has depended on his several years of experience as a goaltender while in grade school.
- No. 5. "IAN SEWELL—Left Defence (6'0", 165 lbs.). Ian comes from Falois, Quebec and is a Sophomore Forester. Ian learned of his hockey playing with Bishop's College School and the Canadian Army Overseas. He and his brother Pete have been largely responsible for the success of the Alexander outdoor rink this year.
- No. 6. "JERRY GAUDET—Left Defence (6'0", 180 lbs.). Jerry is a Moncton boy and is a Sophomore Civil. He played Intermediate five years in Bathurst while attending Sacred Heart School and College where he got his B.A.
- No. 7. "DON HICKS—Centre (5'9", 160 lbs.). Don is a Junior Pre-dental student and comes from Dorchester. This is Don's third season with Varsity and has played in High School and with Debert, N. S. while in the RCAF. Don was 1st leading batter in the York County County Baseball League. He has served on the A.A.A. two years being past Secretary and present Vice-President.
- No. 8. "BOB RYAN—Captain and Right Wing (5'7", 155 lbs.). Bob being Howie's brother, came from Truro and is a Senior Civil. In 1941 Bob helped Truro Junior B's reach to the Nova Scotia title. He played for Acadia in 1942-'45, Pictou Shipyard's A.P.C. entry 1945 and UNB 1947-'48. Bob's fingers are well acquainted with the piano key board and he can often be found pounding the ivories at the gym.
- No. 9. "TED BEDARD—Left Wing (5'5", 158 lbs.). Ted is from North Bay, Ontario and being coach of the Junior Foresters Hockey team must be a Junior Forester. Ted played junior hockey in North Bay and Intermediate with Charlottetown Navy and UNB. Ted also plays Intramural Basketball for the Newman Club.
- No. 10. "ROSS KELLIE—Left Wing (5'5", 155 lbs.). "Kellie" is a Verdun boy and is a Freshman Science student. In the Montreal area he played for Verdun High School and juvenile. His experience in Canadian Football gained him a berth on UNB's English Rugby team last fall.
- No. 11. "CY SPEAR—Centre (5'11", 185 lbs.). Cy is a Junior Civil and hails from St. George. The big man of the second line played three years in High School hockey and also a season in the Army. Cy played on the Alexander College Baseball team in the summer of 1946 and played Varsity Football last year.
- No. 12. "BOB DICKSON—Right Wing (5'4", 135 lbs.). Bob's home town is Dunnville, Ontario, and is enrolled as a Sophomore Forester. He played Juvenile and Junior hockey in Dunnville and was active in hockey while at H. M. C. S. Cornwallis.
- No. 13. "ED SEARS—Right Wing (5'7", 145 lbs.). Being from Bathurst Ed naturally likes hockey and played three years in High School. Besides being an ambitious Sophomore Engineer he is Treasurer of the Newman Club.
- No. 14. "SAMMY SANSOM—Centre and Left Wing (5'7", 155 lbs.). Sammy is a Senior Forester and comes from Stanley, N. B. This is Sammy's fourth year with Varsity making him the old man of the team. He also played in High School and one year for Robbsey's Collegiate School. This year he coached the Senior Foresters dynamic hockey team in the Intramural hockey league.
