continue to share, as they do, not merely common ideals, but like means of furthering international friendship, and like methods of dealing with international questions as they arise. I cannot think of anything more important than that, unless it be a widening of the circle so that the friendship between our two countries on this continent may extend to all parts of the British Commonwealth of Nations. In that way, we are not merely developing a sense of security which could not possibly be obtained in any other way, we are also setting an example to the world, an example which the world needs more than any other at this time. I cannot wish too sincerely that the members of the Club may continue through the years to come, as they have throughout the past, to follow and to further that great ideal.

You have been kind enough, Mr. How, to refer to the many years I have been in public life, to my many years of office, and to speak in that connection of the direction of the Nation's affairs as Canada has gone forward into complete nationhood. It is true I have now had a good many years in public life and in office; but if I have had any
