Some of the Local Councils have established and corried on Pure Milk Stations where pure milk is provided for poor children.

One of the Local Councils has established a "Rest Room" for the benefit of women from the country, and others, coming to the town for a few hours.

Some of the Local Councils have secured the appointment of Police Women, and one Local Council has secured the establishment of a Women's Police Court.

The Council has worked for the establishment of Juvenile Courts in many places.

It has worked for the promotion of Agriculture as an employment for women.

It has assisted the Trained Nurses in their effort to secure Government Registration.

It has drawn the attention of the Government to the need of a change in the law concerning chattel mortgages, on behalf of the poor.

Through some of the Local Councils it has worked for and secured Medical Inspection in Schools.

It has promoted the cause of a Compulsory Education Law in Provinces where such does not exist.

It has tried to secure Dominion Registration for Teachers.

It has published a pamphlet containing the laws, both Provincial and Dominion, that affect Women and Children.

It has worked for the Suppression of the White Slave Traffic, and has tried to warn parents of the dangers of the same.

It has worked for Jail Reform, especially for the prevention of even the temporary incarceration of the Insane in Jails.

It has through its Standing Committee tried to advance the cause of Peace and Arbitration.

It has drawn the attention of the authorities to the unsanitary condition of many railway trains and stations.

The following is a list of the principal Resolutions passed and papers, addresses and reports given at the Annual Meetings since the Council was formed in 1893 to 1913 inclusive, which are published in the Year Books.
