INFLUENCE OF LYNCHING.

Perhaps the most demoralizing and
harmful result of mob violence is the
hardening effect which it has upon
our youth. I think it is safe to say
that on an average fifty persons wit-
nessed the execution by lynching of
every man or woman that has taken
place in this country. According to
this, it is safe to say that, within the
last sixteen years, 125,000 persons
have been present when lynchings
took place. In each case a large pro-
portion of those who had been drawn
to witness the unlawful execution
have been children, or those of tender
age. One of the saddest remarks
of a child was when he said, in my
presence, that he wished he could see
a man burned. I do not think the
impression made upon a youth by re-
siding in the fact that he has witnessed
the unlawful execution of an individ-
ual ever wholly disappears. In some
instances, the executions by mobs
have not only been witnessed by boys
of tender age, but by women.
