PARLIAMEN'

THE SPEAKER'S CHAIR A SILENT MONUMENT TO FATE.

Old Oak Chair Steed for Many Years in Confederation Hall, Kilkenny, But Has Passed Into Private Hands-Strong and Solid, Though Not As Comfortable As

Speaker's Chair at Westminster.

Perhaps one of the most interesting chairs in the country is that which played so important a part in Irish history of bygone days. Ireland was even more rebellious to English rule in the times of the Commonwealth than she has been in our own century, and in Cromwell's time the Irish formed a Parliament of their own, which assembled not at Dublin, as we might suppose, but at Kilkenny. On this occasion, in defiance of all the promulgations of the draaded "Butcher" and his Roundhead friends, a "Speaker" was duly elected by the assembled "Parliament," and, in due course, "took the chair." For many years the old oak chair stood in the Confederation Hall, Kilkenny, a silent innument to the fate of rebel "Parliaments," for those who had bowed to the de-

crees of its occupant had suffered severely at the hands of Cromwell for their temerity. Then the chair was removed, and subsequently passed into private hands. This fine piece of furniture, of which we give a sketch, is strong and solid, though the rigid back and hard, flat seat give one the impression that, even from a comfortable point of 'view, it is scarcely so desirable a "Speaker's chair" as we find at Westminster, says Lloyd's Weekly.

The imposing building in Dublin which formed the Houses of Parliament in pre-union days is now the Bank of Ireland. The latter was first established at St. Mary's Abbey, Dublin, in June, 1783. In 1802 the Government acquired the old Parliament building on College Green at a cost of £10,000, but the business was not removed there until May,

was not removed there until May, 1808. Outwardly there is no change in its appearance, but the Lower House has been greatly enlarged and added to for the purposes of the bank. The House of Lords remains intact, and is used as the Court of Proprietors.

FOLLOWED BY SHARKS.

Shipwreeked Crew's Awful Voyage in Ope Best on the Ocean. The wreck of the schooner Victor,

The wreck of the schooner Victor, and the terrible sufferings of the crew, who for eleven days battled in an open boat with a shoal of sharks, are reported from San Francisco.

The Victor was wrecked on the rocky shore of the Island of Papataki, one of the Society Islands, and the crew of five men, with Captain Hardy, took to the ship's boat.

They had no compass and no sail, and with little more than one day's provisions and six cocoanuts they started to row to Papeete, Tahiti. Several times the boat was almost swamped, and the clothing of the unfortunate mariners was saturated over and over again.

From the outset the rations each man got deily were not sufficient for one meal, and with the constant rowing and exposure day and night and little sleep the meen soon became worn out, and suffered intensely.

came worn out, and suffered intensely.

The water gave out, and had it not been for the milk of the cocoanuts the men would have gone mad with thirst.

Captain Hardy and his men had a continual combat with the sharks, and the oars were splintered and broken in repelling the attacks of the ferocious brutes.

During the eleven days and nights it took the men to reach Papeete the sharks never left the trail of the boat.

For the last two days of their long row the entire crew were so atterly done up that frequently the men had not sufficient strength to lift the cars, and three became crazy.

teen Alexandra Could Contract Debta Her Husband's Name and His Ma-jesty Weuld Not Be Responsible.

Great interest was aroused recently by the circumstance that in a grave national crisis, when the King was for-the moment inaccessible, the ministers of state were summoned to the presence of Queen Alexandra for consultation, with, as was generally understood, most satisfactory results. This was quite a new depar-

sults. This was quite a new departure for the present reign, says London Tit-Bits.

Of course, Queen Victoria played this sovereign part constantly, but her late Majesty was the head of the state and it was the proper course for her to pursue. Except when considered as part of the King and Sovereign, Queen Alexandra is not the head of the state. She enjoys a position of her own which is absolutely unique. Whilst it differs from that of the King it also differs from that of any other lady, married or single, or of any rank, and in some material ways it is also different from that of previous queen consorts.

One of the most curious and interesting provisions in the law and customs of the state is that the Queen is, for private business pur-Queen is, for private business purposes, not regarded as a married lady at all. She is the only lady in Great Britain who does not come within the scope of the Married Women's Property Act. The principle of the law is that the King is entirely different from all other married men, and that his time is too fully taken up with the affairs of state for him to have any left to devote to domestic matters, and that therefore the whole management of the Queen's the whole management of the Queen's private business matters must de-volve upon Her Majesty singly, and

that no responsibility whatever in respect to them rests upon the King. Therefore, if such a thing could be imagined as the Queen contracting debts in her husband's name, the King would not be responsible for them, as any other husband would be unless he had given due notice to tradesmen and all others concerned that he would for the future decline to settle all such accounts.

If the King contracted debts, the aw which says that His Majesty can do no wrong would prevent anybody from suing him for recovery of the amount due; but no such protection is granted to the Queen, who could be proceeded against in the ordinary manner. She has her own Attorney-General and Solicitor-General to represent her in all logal matters, though, of course, except for ordi-nary private purposes, their services are scarcely ever needed.

Whilst the Constitution is glad to Whilst the Constitution is glad to recognize the Queen as part of the monarchy, it cannot lose sight of the fact that after all her positien is limited to that of Queen Consort, and therefore she is in a very large sense one of His Majesty's subjects, and in certain cases, which there is no human possibility of occurring in these times, she would be therefore these times, she would be freated as a subject. But in other respects she is accorded privileges by the realm which are given to no other person except the King.

Particularly there is the question

of high treason. It is generally un-derstood that the King is the only person whom it is high treason to plot against; but it would be high treason also to plot against Queen Alexandra. All Consorts of British Alexandra. All Consorts of British monarchs have not enjoyed this privilege. When Philip of Spain married Queen Mary it was denied to him, though some time after the marriage a special Act of Parliament was passed in which he was granted the

The signature "Edward Rex" is attached to all State documents of such importance as to demand it. But in no circumstances whatever would the corresponding one "Alex-andra Regina" be allowed to be attached, either in conjunction with that of His Majesty or without it. If it should happen that the Queen should survive the King, many of the privileges which she at present pos-sesses would be withdrawn from her, sesses would be withdrawn from her, only nominally in some cases but actually in others, whilst constitutional law provides that some curious restrictions shall be placed upon her. It would no longer be high treason to plot against her, and it is held by at least one high authority that she could not marry again it she wished could not marry again if she wished to do so without the special license and permission of the King's succes-

All this, as has been made clear, is the very strict and essential legal view which the Constitution, having regard to difficulties which have oc-curred in the past, finds it necessary curred in the past, finds it necessary to take in theory of the position of the Queen; but in the hearts of the people, as we all know, she exercises complete and supreme authority as the first lady, and one upon whom there can be no limitations whilst England is governed as it is.
