WARMBAD FALLEN.

German Garrison in Southwest Africa Reported to Have Perished.
London, June 5.—A despatch to a news agency from Cape Town says native reports have been received in official headquarters to the effect that Warmbad, the German headquarters in Southwest Africa, has fallen, and that the garrison has perished.
No news is obtainable, except from native sources.

Threw Stone Through Train.
Brookville, June 4.—A man named Whaley was charged in the Police Court yesterday with hurling a stone through a window of a passenger train on the Brookville, Westport & Northern Railway, near Athens. The train was running at a fair speed, and the stone struck a lady passenger in the face, knocking her from the seat. Out of consideration for his wife and family, the charge was reduced to common assault, to which he pleaded guilty. The fine and costs amounted to upwards of \$50.

Fort Erie Man Missing.
Buffalo, N. Y., June 5.—W. Vance Cerey, a wholesale liquor dealer in Fort Erie, Ont., probably one of the best known men along the Canadian frontier, has been missing from his home in Fort Erie since last Friday night, and inquiry has been begun by the Canadian authorities in an effort to learn something concerning his whereabouts. Just now Cerey's store, near the Buffalo Ferry landing, is in charge of two constables detailed for duty by the sheriff of Welland County.

LABOR TROUBLE

Local Working Men Engaged by Electric Railway Make a Complaint to Acting Mayor Austin

Bright and early this morning a deputation from the laborers of the city called upon Acting Mayor Austin to enlist the aid of the city in an attempt to prevent the use of outside labor in the work the Electric Railway Company has to do in the city.

It seems that the Company hires men at fifteen cents an hour, putting them at whatever work is to be done. The city laborers claim extra pay for dock work. The imported laborers do not object to doing this work for the usual pay and are, therefore, being used.

The city laborers were under the impression that the company's contract with the city stipulated that only local labor should be used within the city. The Acting Mayor gave them a courteous reception, but pointed out that the contract with the city did not bind the city to see that only local labor was employed, and that the matter is entirely between the company and its employees.

The company claims that they are quite willing to hire all the local laborers available at fifteen cents an hour. They then reserve the right of placing them at whatever is to be done—a contention which seems quite reasonable.
