Weekly Market Review. The market for the past week has shown considerable activity, one of the most active stocks being Morrison, which sold all the way from 15 to 18 cents. Monarch shares have also been in good demand, and a large block was disposed of in England. The shaft is now down 100 feet, and a contract has been let for 200 feet of tunnelling. We consider shares in this property a good investment. The Monarch company owns five claims, situate near Hall Sidain, in the Nelson division, and is a copper-gold proposition, reported on favorably by F. C. Robbins, mining engineer for Mann and Mackenzie. On a report that work is soon to be commenced on the Deer Park, shares in this company have again come into demand, and have experienced an advance of 2 cents. Camp McKinney stocks continue active, Minnehaha, Cariboo, Sailor and Kamloops being most in evidence. Work will be commenced shortly on an extensive scale on both the Sailor and Kamloops. Ymir stocks keep well to the front, Tamarac, Fairmont and Dundee especially. Tamaracs are the most popular shares on the local market, and not a day passing without some 5,000 or 10,000 changing hands. The Tamarac company owns five claims, situate three miles from Ymir and is a free milling proposition, averaging \$16 to the ton. A shaft has been sunk 225 feet and drifting is now in progress at that level. The Fairmont company owns two claims, the Morning and Evening Star, extensions of the Dundee. Work is being concentrated on the Evening Star; the shaft is down 100 feet, and a contract will be let for a further 100 feet. At the 100-foot level there are 4 1/2 feet of ore averaging \$22 per ton.
