

DIFFERENCE BETWEEN

But while no such perfect aim is required, the problem is almost infinit ely more complicated. Aircraft commands far greater differences in speed and a far wider freedom in the choice of course. The target being in a different plane from the gun, one range scale is no use. This is a small matter compared

with the difficulties which arise from the aircraft's speed, the difficulties of ascertaining its course, and the difficulties of observing fire. The point of aim will have to be at varying number of lengths in front of the tar get as the Zeppelin proceeds upon her course

"How," he asks, "are these changes of range and deflection to be obtained? The elements obviously depend upon observations, computations, and calculations, and make the results useful there must be perfect - communications with the guns. The rapidity with which exact results must be supplied makes it quite inconceivable that these operations should be carried out solely by visual, mental and manual operations."


