



The report also shows an improved slightly below 70 per cent. of the total, but in 1912 it was 70.4 per cent. A notable departure for the year in the Paris Public School was the establishment of a department of domestic science which under the management of Miss Goldie has become popular and useful part of the school work. Besides, it has paved the way for the department of manual training which has been organized since the beginning of the present

The report closes with a reference to the need of more provision for manual work in the primary classes work with seissors, paste, cardboard paper, cardboard, clay or plasticine and other simple materials. School gardening and sewing are recommended as simple occupations that could very profitably be associated with school work.

Finally it is suggested that some form of medical and dental inspection s both desirable and feasible even for rural schools. While much has been done and much more can still be accomplished by way of improvng hygienic conditions about the school, the belief is growing that in the interest of the future health and happiness of the children, competent medical inspection should be provided for our schools.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother son
