WANT REMOVAL OF THE OFFICER

Alleged That He Was Too Friendly With Cafe Proprietor.

(By Special Wire to The Courier)

MONTREAL, Feb. 9.—Charges against J. Lambkin, recently appointed by the Dominion Government as special officer dealing with white slave conditions, were made at a meeting of the Methodist Union of Temperance and Moral Reform held in the St. James Methodist Church on Saturday afternoon. The charges are, in brief, that Mr. Lambkin has been rather too friendly with Parker Brothers, proprietors of the Cafe Parisien, and others in the same line of business, and that his evidence before the license commissioners recently was noticeably so unimpressive that it aroused a comment from the Recorder Weir. It was decided to report the affair to Hon. C. J. Doherty, Minister of Justice, with a view to having Mr. Lambkin removed from office, and Reo T. E. Whitley, president of the Union, asserted that he would lose no time in investigating the charges put on a specific basis.

Mr. Lambkin this morning declared that the charges would probably result in his resignation. "I hardly know Parker Brothers," he said. "I don't think I was flippant on the witness stand during the Parisien investigation, and I do feel that I told the truth. Of course, the reformers were expecting something different from me, perhaps; they probably expected that I would—no, I won't say lie—but uphold the charges against the Parisien in full, and this I couldn't honestly do."

The Premier Has Passed Danger Point

But the Condition of Sir George Ross is Reported Critical.

DAILY FASHION HINT.



No. 6,574, Girl's Dress.

This dressy frock gives us a plain blouse, with front closing and sleeves inserted in the regulation manner. It is quite full at the lower portion where the skirt is attached. This may be gathered or pleated, as preferred. Over the blouse is worn a bolero jacket, with short rounded fronts and short sleeves. Two materials or one may be used in making and the bolero may be omitted if desired.

The dress pattern, No. 6,574, is cut in sizes 4, 6, 8, 10, 12 and 14 years. Medium size requires for the dress, without bolero, $\frac{2}{3}$ yards of 40 inch material, the bolero requires $\frac{3}{4}$ yard of 36 inch. As in back view 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ yards of 36 inch plain goods and 3 yards of 15 $\frac{1}{2}$ inch embroidered flounce will be needed.


Albert Brown

James Duff, Minister of Agriculture, for Ontario, will take advantage of the occasion to send Mr. Stich a congratulatory telegram. In winning in his district the prize offered by the Ontario Government for the most productive acre, Mr. Stich achieved a remarkable record for Ontario, and for Canada. His sample acre produced 427 1-2 bushels of potatoes, which while it exceeded by over one hundred bushels the yield in potatoes of any other sample acres, is also probably a record in yield of potatoes for the whole of Canada.
