SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Do minion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties-Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along-side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per

Duties—Six months' residence in each of thre; years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Preemption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

WINNIPEG, 'Aug. 26.—Wheat prices made another substantial advance this morning after the opening, which was ½c to ¾c higher. Within the first hour there were gains around 2½c to 2½c over yesterday's close in all months. The market continued bullish, the greater part of the receipts being held by farmers, the general opinion crediting higher prices. Later further advances occurred after midday and during the last half hour the market was wild and nervous with wide fluctuations. Closing prices were 2½c to 5½c higher.

The cash demand for eastern millers continues strong for all grades of wheat, but offerings are light. Oats, barley and flax are in good demand. Exporters are doing nothing, prices being out of line. Cash grains closed: Wheat, 3%c to 4%c higher; oats, unchanged to 2c higher; barley, 1c higher; flax, 1c higher.

NEW YORK, Aug. 27-A cable to The Tribune from London says: Regarding the reverses reported in France, where the falling back of the French forces also compelled the British retirement, all accounts show that the British army behaved with the utmost gallantry. They were unbeaten when the general situation necessitated Joffre's order of retirement, all along the line. England has received the news of the loss of 2,000 men with calm re-serve, although it is England's greatest loss in one battle since the Crimean war. The list of casualties has not been received, leaving thousands of relatives and friends distressed and worrying. If anything, England's enthusiasm for war has been stimulated by the British troops participating, and when the casualties list is published it is likely to have the effect

of fully arousing the British lion. Lord Kitchener's new army 40f 100,,000 has practically been recruited, but thousands of men are still needed, and a vigorous campaign to obtain recruits is being instituted. The latest device is pasting flaming posters on hundreds of taixcabs, saying: "A call to arms. Enlist for the

NEW YORK, Aug 27—A London Standard despatch from Paris

to hTe Tribune says:
The correspondent of Le Temps who had occasion to follow them on the way to the front, is loud in his admiration of the British soldiers' discipline, equipment and commissariat arrangements. But what he admired most was the summary methods of dealing with spies, everyone discovered being shot immediately. A British cap-tain explained his attitude through a French interpreter as follows;

"You French pride yourselves on your humanity in cases where humanity is a mere useless sentimentality. To spare the life of a spy by postponing his trial is a crime against our own troops. A spy may be able by some means to convey a harvest of news to his own side, so as to enable the enemy to surprise us precisely when we hoped to surprise him. In such cases in opportune indulgence may cost the lives of several hundreds of our own troops."
