To-day the editors of local papers do the most work for the least money of any people living."

A Note of Warning.

There has been issued, by direction of the Minister of Agriculture at Ottawa, a conspicuous poster calling the attention of potato growers to the importance of examining their crop to ascertain whether or not it is infected with 'Potato Canker.' The hanger shows in natural colors a potato plant the whole yield of which is affected by the disease. It also shows the appearance of individual tubers in which the canker has started to work. Growers who discover suspicious symptoms of the disease in their crop are requested to send affected specimens to the Dominion Botanist, Experimental Farm, Ottawa. The poster is issued as Farmers' Circular No. 3, of the Division of Botany and is being distributed by the Publications Branch of the Department of Agriculture.

Band Concert in Wolfville.

Political Impressions.

BY REVIEWER.

We were not surprised that so noted an ex-Canadian as the Rev. Dr. Charles Eaton, pastor of the Madison Avenue Baptist church of New York, President of the Canadian Society of that city, a native of Nova Scotia, should, while stopping at the Halifax Hotel, be called upon by a reporter of The Morning Chronicle, neither were we surprised that he gave utterance to some silly nonsense. The Rev. Doctor is nothing if not emphatic and somewhat spectacular in his views, and his native eloquence helps him wonderfully.

This Rev. Dr. Eaton is not a 'Flag-Flapper' or a waver of the Union Jack, or even of the Maple Leaf. He was always, while a Canadian, of the other sort and of the gritty stripe too. We think he shows mighty poor taste when he, an American citizen, comes over to Canada on a visit for the recovery of his health, and sits down before a newspaper reporter and undertakes to insult those 'Flag-Waving' Canadians who, he says, are 'tiresome.' He, in his wisdom, is a sworn citizen of Uncle Sam, and takes off his hat when the Stars and Stripes are unfurled. He has sworn to defend and protect the United States of America against all comers and especially England, whom 'Sam' seems to hate, and while he may or may not be orthodox and of a sound or unsound theology, we have some suspicions of a man who insults the loyal citizens of a land that bore him and gave him his skill at the trade he seems to have dropped into. Canadians are proud of their country, of its mother land, and the old flag that has protected her against many onslaughts, administered at the hands of a country she had never injured, and a country seized by pure jealousy and unnatural greed, of a country which our eloquent clergyman is a sworn defender.

Dr. J. G. Schurman, President of Cornell University, and recently appointed the Ambassador to the court of Greece, is an out and out enemy of Canada and Great Britain, and yet he was born on Prince Edward Island, and graduated from Acadia College. 'Dr. Charles Eaton,' as The Morning Chronicle so familiarly calls him, was born in Nova Scotia and graduated from Acadia, and he, after swearing fidelity to a foreign and in some respects unfriendly nation, comes down home and insults the very land that gave him birth, many citizens of which are his peers at least. The incident is remarkable, yet familiar in history.

President Schurman is a man of brains and power and knows upon which side of the fence he is, and where the butter is the thickest, but what does this 'Dr. Charles Eaton' know about the economic crisis facing Canada in Sept., 1912. He knows what the wishes of Mr. Taft, Mr. Champ Clark and Mr. Hearst were, and their wishes evidently were his. We could pass over his childish economic effusions and his feeble remarks regarding what he thought of reciprocity and the Panama Canal question, but his brutal and unmanly reference to the loyal and enthusiastic citizens of Canada who 'waved' the old flag will stop. Dr. Eaton would probably be a better politician if he were not so grievously ignorant, and if he knows no more about running Madison Avenue church than he does about Canadian political sentiment, we pity his church. Every one pities New York in her disgrace, savagery and lust, and if Dr. Eaton is any good he should stay there and not act the craven deserter.
