

Notes and Comments

Temperature at an altitude of seven miles is uniformly near the 60 degrees below zero mark.

We are told that eight tons of food unfit for human consumption have been destroyed in Montreal within two months, consisting of beef, veal, mutton, pork, fish and vegetables.

Five hundred and sixty-six marriage licenses were issued in Greater New York City on June 1st. This was the largest number for one day in the history of the license bureau.

The Chicago Housing Association has secured options on two extensive plots and proposes to erect 10,000 new homes, 2,000 of which are expected to be ready before next winter.

How many of the M. P.'s and Senators at Ottawa who are now grabbing for an indemnity of \$4,000 a session got rich on war contracts while the boys were overseas fighting on \$1.10 a day.

An esteemed contemporary is convinced that if as much attention were paid to the cheaper cuts of meat as to the lower cuts of gowns there might be some chance of beinging down the cost of living.

Canada's claim against Germany for reparation for war losses amounts to 1,800 million dollars, or almost equal to the net national debt of the country. But there is precious little hope that we shall ever be repaid more than a trifling part of the vast sum which the war has cost us. The notion that Germany could be "made to pay," unfortunately, appears to have been a sad delusion.

The Gouin (La Loutre) dam on the upper waters of the St. Maurice river, Quebec, has a storage capacity of 160,000,000 cubic feet and a water area of 300 square miles, forming the second largest storage reservoir in the world. It is exceeded in size only by that of Gatun Lake, on the Panama Canal. The storage at Gouin will permit a regulated permanent flow of over 12,000 cubic feet per second at Shawinigan, rendering 1,000,000 horsepower now available on the St. Maurice.

During the month of April eighty-four thousand working days were lost through strikes in Canada. Reckoned at ten hours per day this means that eight hundred and forty thousand hours were unproductive. Calculated at the low figure of fifty cents per hour this tells of a monetary loss to workmen for the month of \$420,000, or at the rate of upward of five million dollars per year, to say nothing of the loss entailed in the industries where these hands were employed.

The Luxury Tax

Ottawa, June 2—An important ruling dealing with the collection of luxury taxes, was issued tonight by the Department of Customs and Inland Revenue. The ruling provides as follows:

"Retail merchants and other vendors of articles subject to the luxury tax who sell to the purchaser for consumption or use, are advised that upon the occasion of each sale of a taxable article the following requirement must be fulfilled, viz:

(1)—An invoice or sales slip, showing the price at which the article is sold, exclusive of tax, and as a separate item, the amount of the luxury tax thereon, shall at the time of sale be delivered by the vendor to the purchaser.

(2)—The vendor shall at the time of sale collect from the purchaser the amount of the luxury tax shown on the sales slip. No merchant is authorized to advertise or announce that he is paying the tax for the purchaser, as in point of fact he is required to collect the tax from the consumer.

Utilize Canada's Resources

Canadians are justly proud of their structural timbers—red pine, western soft pine, tamarack, hemlock, Douglas fir, etc. That the qualities of these timbers may be well known to Canadian builders, so that the importation of no better or even inferior timbers may be reduced the Forestry Branch of the Department of the Interior has issued a publication known as Bulletin No. 59, "Canadian Woods for Structural Timbers", giving the facts about these woods. This has been followed by Bulletin No. 60, "Douglas Fir: Its Mechanical and Physical Properties", which deals with this wood from every point which is of interest to the structural engineer and builder. Those interested may secure these bulletins free upon application to the Director of Forestry, Ottawa.
