

The New Minister of Public Works.

Brilliant Demonstration at Amherst.

On Friday morning last, the friends of Hon. Dr. Tupper, C.B., drove out in force from Amherst to meet and welcome him, on his return from a tour of inspection in the west. There were a six horse team, four horses, double and single teams, gaily flaunting party banners and national flags, and preceded and followed by brass bands discoursing triumphant airs, the procession reaching a distance of some five miles. The speaker escorted him back, and through the town to Coffey's Hotel. The Doctor, afterwards addressed the electors at the Drill Shed, where he was well filled with a most enthusiastic crowd. He said men are sometimes more ready to follow than to lead, and rose to it, but his heart was too full to allow him to do justice to this occasion. He had had many great triumphs in Cumberland, but he valued it to the support of the great party at his back, that they all pale before the brilliancy of the present. He appealed to the people the belief was general and widespread, that for five years more he would sit on the Opposition benches. The gentleman who opposed him made it his great ground of claim. He asked the people to vote for him in accordance with the administration, and the county would suffer in the future, and in the past, if it adopted any other course. During the canvass no word of personal disparagement had escaped him respecting Mr. Phipps, unless he considered a disparagement of his opponent a disparagement of himself. He said that he was a supporter of his (Dr. T.) That was a matter of congratulation to him, because, men must differ on political matters, but there is no reason why these discussions should not be carried on in a gentlemanly and friendly manner. He said that in a civil warfare, without carrying it into private life and making it a matter of personal estrangement and antagonism. That much premised, he considered there was nothing more demoralizing to a country, than for a man to fight for a line principles for their own sake regardless of consequences, for the purpose of obtaining personal or local objects. Hon. John Simpson, a leading man in the Government ranks, when present on his oath admitted that he had been a great agitator, and that he was "a-d-d set of counsellors." Why did he say so? Mr. Phipps in his address asked the people to support him, because he could do more for the people of Cumberland than he could for the Government. Mr. Simpson's statement was a fair one, and he was not prepared to be bought and sold by the men who had the most to offer them. He found men like Albrecht, Smith, Burpee, Laird and Coffinall, bought by seats in a cabinet; men who, had pledged themselves to the electors to support the Government, and in Ottawa, forgot their pledges, and betrayed their principles when a cabinet office was offered them. John Simpson was authorized in his belief that in the Maritime Provinces existed a large body of men ready to be bought and sold to the highest bidder.

whipper-in, to his amazement went over to the enemy. It was a matter of infinite pride to him that he had been sustained by the people, and he redounded to the credit of Nova Scotia that in the teeth of all the opposition he had been elected. He was held out by two Governments, and had cast her lot with the Opposition party. The Government party was overwhelmed with defeat so signal that there was scarcely a spot of them left to disfigure the face of nature. And the Nova Scotia Government was crumbling in the dust. Mr. Morse was an able man, but it was understood that his effort was made merely for a contest. Mr. Phips had boasted that he would carry the elec-

tion; he even doubted whether he would not be graciously reduced to the rank of a private, and with the same salary, after a dozen times over and with all the Government influence, they had given him his greatest triumph twenty-three years. His personal dislike of an unfortunate man, beside its effect on the declaration, stands by its principles, and John Simpson cannot say that we are all accountable. Messrs. Townsend and Vickery, Messrs. Oxley and T. R. Black, the latter for Mr. Lewis, also spoke when Hon. P. A. Landry was called upon, and delivered a short address complimenting Cumberland on being represented by so brilliant a statesman as Charles Tupper.
