EASTER OBSERVED IN FREDERICTON

Typical Spring Weather, New Costumes and Special Church Services.

Easter observation in Fredericton yesterday was marked by typical spring weather for the display of fineries, which showed no shattering as a result of high costs.

The day broke beautifully fine, following a night of showers and some heavy rain, and throughout the day the sun shone brightly, although there was a cold wind blowing most of the time. Although roses were selling at \$2 a piece and carnations at 50 cents each, flowers were everywhere in evidence while spring costumes of a most elaborate character and new designs were worn.

There were exceptionally large congregations at the city churches where special musical programmes and seasonal services were conducted.

St. Paul's Presbyterian Church.
At St. Paul's Presbyterian church, the pastor, Rev. J. S. Sutherland, at the morning service chose for his topic The First Easter Lesson, drawing lessons from the Resurrection. Mrs. Fletcher-Peacock rendered an excellent solo.

At the evening service a trio composed of Mrs. Lockwood, Mrs. Colwell and Miss Madge Kelly furnished an excellent selection while George Brown gave a solo. The subject for the evening sermon was the question: Why Do We Believe in Christ?

Brunswick Street Baptist Church.
At the Brunswick Street Baptist church, the pastor, Rev. G. C. Warren, delivered splendid sermons to a large congregation at both the morning and evening services. At the morning service two new members were received into the church and at the evening service six candidates were baptized.

Christchurch Cathedral.
At Christchurch Cathedral Communion services were held at 7 and 9 a. m. and an unusually large number of communicants were present. At 11 o'clock another Communion service was conducted by Very Rev. Dean Neales. At three o'clock the children's service was held by Rev. Mr. Bullock. At 7 p. m. the service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Bullock. Very Rev. Dean Neales reading the lessons and His Lordship the Bishop preached a powerful sermon on immortality.

The special music by the choir under the leadership of W. J. Smith, A. R. C. O., was of very high order.

Christchurch Parish Church.
At Christchurch Parish church the early Communion services were well attended and at 11 a. m. Holy Communion and Matins were conducted by Rev. A. F. Bate, the Bishop, preaching an inspiring sermon. At three o'clock the children's service was conducted by Rev. A. F. Bate and in the evening a special Easter service was held. The music was exceptionally good at all the services.

At St. Dunstan's.
At St. Dunstan's church at 8:30 a. m. a very large congregation were present and received Holy Communion. At 10:30 high mass was celebrated and Very Rev. P. L. Carney preached a sermon appropriate to the joyous feast of Easter. In the evening, 7:30 p. m., the service was held. The offering for the day was the largest ever taken up at Easter, amounting to \$908.

Methodist Church.
The morning service at the Methodist church was a reception service conducted by the pastor, Rev. G. M. Young, and thirty-five members were admitted to full connection with the church. Miss Alice Boyd, with a solo accompaniment by D. B. Tees, delivered an excellent solo, and a quartet also gave an excellent selection.

At the closing service in the evening John J. Weddell, recording steward of the church, voiced the appreciation of the members for the splendid work done for the church by Evangelist G. S. K. Anderson, who leaves today for Boston.

George Street Baptist.
At the George Street Baptist church special Easter music was rendered and inspiring sermons preached by the pastor at both morning and evening services. The day was also observed as Grand Lagne yesterday by the George Street Baptist Sunday school, and an offering of nearly one hundred and twenty-eight dollars was taken for missions. The attendance was very large, who thoroughly enjoyed a splendid programme presented by members of the school. SPIES AS ACTIVE AS EVER IN BRITAIN

London, April 4.—The British government is taking steps to restrict the operations in England of spies from foreign countries. The House of Commons has just adopted anti-spy regulations at the request of Sir Ernest Holt, the solicitor general, who told the members of the House that information was now being collected here for foreign governments and that this ought to be stopped for the sake of the country's safety.

"Spies are as active in this country as ever," said Brigadier Cockburn, director of Special Intelligence at the War Office.

He sent twenty-five beautiful potted plants, besides oranges, apples, and some bush cuttings, some up in daisy-wrappings to represent butterflies.

The Red Cross Society contributed twenty-five potted plants and ice cream for dinner. The ladies auxiliary of the G. W. V. A. sent potted ferns and orchids, which were obtained by a contribution of \$25 from the members of the hospital.

The hospital was a perfect bower of beauty yesterday, a potted plant being at the bedside of each patient, besides being placed in the recreation rooms and halls. The dinner was an especial one, and each table was adorned with a potted plant. In the evening the ministering circle of the King's Daughters entertained the boys at a singing and refreshments.

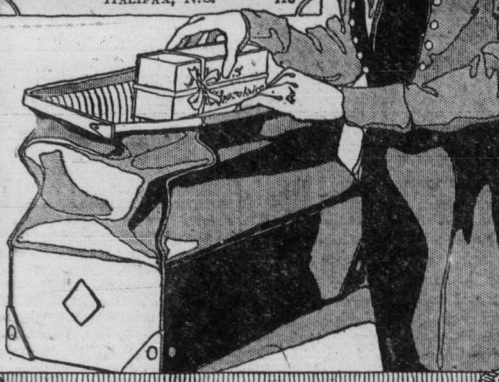

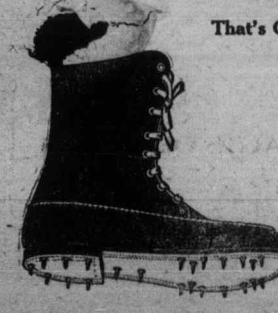
