That the business men and citizens generally of the town are strongly in favor of an all day electric service is evidenced more and more with each interview the Graphic obtains on the subject. This paper has yet to encounter a man who opposes the proposition.

J. R. Henderson.
Mr. Henderson stated that if an all day electric service were operated he would use electricity exclusively for iron heating. He would also use the service considerably in his workshop and basement. He was, in short, strongly in favor of an all day electric service and felt that a town of this size should have it.

McRae Bros.
D. R. McRae, head of this firm, stated that although he did not use a great deal of electricity himself, he was greatly in favor of an all day electric service and thought it would greatly encourage industries to locate here. He would use the service on dark days in the store, basement and in his house.

E. J. Allingham.
Mr. Allingham said that he was strongly in favor of an all day electric service. At the present time he uses an oil lamp in his basement and in his office during the day. It would be an inducement to industries to locate here.

Mr. Alexander declared himself greatly in favor of the service provided that it were self-sustaining. He felt that if it were once given a trial he would not doubt prove successful. He would use it on dark days in his store and basement. It would be useful in various ways, particularly for light, power and fire alarm.

W. L. Goodman.
Mr. Goodman said that he was greatly in favor of the service. He was negotiating for an electric massage machine for his tonorial parlor and would certainly use it if an all day electric service were established. He would use the light in his barber shop throughout the day.

Richard Ellsworth.
Mr. Ellsworth stated that if there was an all day electric service he would install an electric motor to operate small machinery in his blacksmith shop. He was decidedly in favor of the service.

This morning about ten o'clock, a fire broke out in the residence of R. A. Murdoch. After the hose had been played for upwards of half an hour the flames were subdued. The damage was mainly to floors, ceilings and window casings in the rear part of the building.
