The Education Bill.

The Bill to amend the Education Act, which had, for some time, been under discussion in the House of Assembly, passed yesterday afternoon on the following division:—

Yeo, Richards and Sutherland were not in their places when the vote was taken, the reason for their absence at that particular moment it is not of course open to us to divine.

As we pointed out before, and everybody knows, Education is costing too much in this Province at the present time. During the year 1886 the amount paid out of the Provincial Treasury for educational purposes was nearly \$112,000. This is a much higher rate per capita than is paid in any other country.

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The New Board of Trade.

The Montreal Board of Trade recently instituted a movement having for its object the convocation of an International Congress of representatives from the different Boards of Trade in Canada and the United States, for the purpose of taking into consideration the best methods of arriving at a satisfactory solution of the difficulties which may at present exist between this country and the United States relative to trade and commerce.

The Education Bill.

The Education Bill, which, last week, passed the House of Assembly by a large majority of votes, was one of the most important measures which our legislators have, for some time, been called upon to consider.
