As was indicated in the House last session-and more outside of the Chamber than inside-Mr. King, though leading what essentially a Quebec party, was persona non grata with certain of his followers. There are other considerations. The Government party at present claims to be re presentative of both the old parties, and a Liberal member who for any reason might wish to affiliate himself with them might, it is argued, do so without sacrificing his personal conviction so long as he subscribes to the platform of the party. In its tariff aspect it is essentially the same as was maintained by Sir Wilfrid during his term of office.

Another factor in the situation generally seems to be that Quebec does not particularly relish her present imposed isolation from the Council of the Government. There have always been three or four French Ministers, whose part in the Government was conspicuous, but at present the lone representative is Hon. P. E. Blondin, who sits in the Senate, not Commons.
