EDMONTON CROPS. Lands Department Manager for Best Crops Area in the Edmonton and Stettler Districts—Fall of Grains. Says, Will be Good.

Aug. 8.—C. W. Peterson, of Lands department, who has a tour of inspection of the command agencies in Central and Alberta, returned to the city

regarding crop conditions in the country north of Calgary, he said: "I am somewhat disappointed. I had hoped that the crop of Northern and Central Alberta would have been sufficiently favored, bringing up the provincial average to 15 bushels in view of the early crops in the south. My trip the best part of ten days, during which I visited our branch a good deal of driving along the Trunk Pacific and Canadian lines, and I think I had an opportunity of fairly sizing up the conditions of the country.
