The doctor then travelled back to the ship and was tired out after his long journey.

A Free Fight.

Sergeant Mackey with four officers went there with haste and found a number of drunken men from one of the settlements fighting and swearing. All were placed under arrest and two of them had to be handcuffed. The men were conveyed to the police station and their horses were put in Kavanagh's stable.

Parade & Field Sports.

The whole battalion of the C. C. C. were at their armoury last night and were put through drill by Adjutant Kent. The lads were drawn up and were addressed by Lieut.-Col. Greene, Hon. Jno. Harris and Rev. Bro. Kennedy, and it was announced that on Coronation Day, June 22nd, the members of the four city brigades will hold a sports' day. In the forenoon there will be a joint parade of the brigades and the afternoon's fete between them will be held in St. George's Field. Prizes will be given for the various events and excellent contests will no doubt result between the members of the brigades.

Smallpox at Lamaline.

Another case of smallpox has developed at Lamaline, brought there from Sydney. The Health Officer received the report last evening. This is the third case that has been at Lamaline this season. The other patients are now recovered.

A Special Bargain.

Special Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, To-Day. The European Government, which was the first to raise the point officially, has been advised by the State Department that the tariff concessions offered to Canada under the Reciprocity Agreement will not be extended by the States to other nations under their treaties with this country. The Department declined to disclose the name of the country which raised the question. The reply of the Department pointed out that the Reciprocity Agreement was in the nature of a bargain with the States. The lowering of the tariff here was in return for similar concessions. The concessions granted to Canada can be obtained by other countries only through special agreements.

The Chick Case.

CAPTAIN DENIES STORY

This morning we had a visit from Capt. Courtney of the Olinda, who denies that the coloured man Chick is either left stranded or destitute. He states he shipped him as mate in Barbados and when the arrival here he shipped another mate a white man, keeping Chick's as boatswain. He tells us that a dispute arose between the Custom's Officer and Chick's on Saturday, the latter threatening the former with a baying pin, and that another dispute also arose between the white mate and Chick. The matter was referred to him and he told the coloured man that he would give him no more work on the ship, paid \$4.00 to him to get him back on board ashore. Afterwards he gave him the key of the galley telling him he could eat on board and sleep there, intending to take him back as a man before the mast. The captain knows Chick slept at the S. A. Depot last night, but has no knowledge whether he slept on board ship the night before as he was not on board the ship, but staying in the country. We learn that Chick this morning visited the Police Commissioner's office and told him his story, and that he was willing to be sent by the Captain to Halifax. As there was apparently a dispute between the Captain and Chick as to the shipping he was advised to see the Shipping Master, or a lawyer. The Captain told us that Mr. St. Hill gave orders yesterday for his accommodation on board the vessel. The Captain states he is willing to take Chick before the mast and meanwhile he can go on board. From the S. A. Depot we learn that Chick has been sleeping but not eating there.

Manufacture of Peat Proves Successful.

Mr. Arthur J. Forward, of Ottawa, secretary of the Canadian Peat Society, who is in Montreal to-day, stated that the Government demonstration plant which has been established at Alfred, Ont., on the short line between Montreal and Ottawa, last summer, manufactured 1,000 tons of peat fuel, and about half of this was sold in Ottawa. The Government has also established a plant in Ottawa for furnishing electric power from peat gas, and is operating a crushing and sampling plant for the Geological Department in connection with it. This plant has a capacity of 40 h.p., and it has been demonstrated that peat fuel at \$2 a ton will produce one horse power per hour at 10 hours a day for a total fuel cost for the year of \$7.50, which is much cheaper than coal.

Mr. Forward says Dr. Haanel, the director of mines for the Government has made a careful estimate showing that there are 37,000 square miles of peat bogs in this country. Most of these are in provinces or portions of provinces where there are no coal deposits, and if developed, therefore, they will be of great value locally.—Star.

DEAD ON RANGER.—The man Preston referred to by us yesterday dead on the Ranger, not the Adventure, we learn from the Bloodhound. He is a native of Pool's Island. Capt. Winsor was on board of her last week and she reports for 14,000 seals old and young.

Rev. Fr. McGuire, arrived in town this week from Canada via steamer to Bell Island. He celebrated High Mass and preached at the R. C. Church at St. John's last Sunday week. Since leaving St. John's last fall Father McGuire has made a European tour and spent a few weeks in Rome.

The ambulance was called out to Crossie's wharf on the arrival of the Stella Maris last night to take Mrs. Roberts, of Twigg's, to the General Hospital. John Power, of Flatrock, who was on the Viking to the seal fishery was taken to the Hospital this morning and Johnathan Lilly of Allan Square, was also taken there. He is suffering from an internal complaint.

SICK SEALERS ARRIVE.—The S. S. Florizel brought in one of her crew named Peter Best, of Brookfield, B. B., who is very ill owing to an abscess under his arm. Another man named Best was transferred to the ship from the Eagle, Sunday, and he is also very ill. Another man from the Eagle also suffering from consumption was brought in by the Florizel, and both will be sent to their homes in Bonaville Bay.

Viking Arrived.

The Viking, Capt. W. Bartlett, arrived here from the Gulf seal fishery at 1.20 this morning and anchored on the quarantine ground by order of the Health authorities, where a clean bill of health was given the crew after the doctor visited the ship. There is no sickness on board. Sailing from Channel on March the 10th, Captain Bartlett struck the seals on the 18th on the east side of Bryon Island, and in four days secured 17,500. The Kite, Southern Cross and the Labrador were in the same ice, but the former could not get into the seals owing to his propeller being broken. The Viking had a hard time of it in the storm of Monday but she weathered it all right.

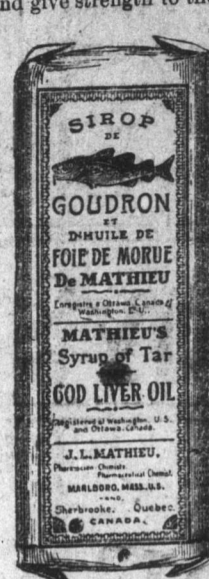
