## Constitutional Struggle Over.

With the passing of the Parliamentary Bill by the House of Lords the struggle between the two Houses of Parliament has come to a conclusion with a decided victory for the House of Commons. The vapourings of the reactionary lords can well be discounted.

They accepted the detronement of the few great governing families which was the main effect of the Reform Bill of 1832, and which was the first step towards the House of Commons becoming truly representative of the commonality of the United Kingdom, and they will accept the principles of the Parliamentary Bill. The Parliament Bill embodies the principles of shorter parliaments, the absolute and practically exclusive control of the House of Commons over financial matters, and the limitation of the retarding power of the House of Lords on other legislation to a period of two years roughly.

## The Harmony Here.

The Moravian ship Harmony arrived here last evening from Labrador bringing a freight of furs and seal skins. Capt. Jackson left London on June 30th and arrived at Macovic on the 16th July. Delaying there two days the Harmony went north, calling at Hopedale, Nain, Okak and Hebron, landing provisions for the mission and taking on board the skins and furs caught during the winter. There was a good deal of slack ice lying off Macovic on the 15th of July, but only a few scattered strings from that down to Rowsell's Harbor, where the ship went after leaving Hebron to take a load of wood bought from the owners of the mining claim there. Coming back, too, some ice was met off Hebron and Cut Throat, with a score of Newfoundland schooners had put in to get clear of the ice. A N.E. breeze was packing it in on the shore. There was only a narrow string of it and the first change of wind would drive it off shore in a few hours. There was nothing done with the fish from Macovic to Rowsell's Harbor up to last Saturday. In fact the fleet of fishing schooners had only just arrived down and were putting their traps in the water. Last Saturday Capt. Jackson met a large fleet of schooners north of Cut Throat. They were going down to Ryan's Strand, should the ice prevent them from getting on so far. The s.s. Stella Maris was met last week at Hopedale. After discharging her load of wood at Hebron the Harmony came right direct to St. John's. Capt. Jackson reports that all the natives on the mission are well and that the past winter was a poor one for seals. The spring sealing was a flat failure and the winter was unpleasant among the furriers.

They went inland over the hills to get wood for the mission station, and were caught in a blizzard that came on suddenly. Not returning that night a gang of men went in search of them next day and found the two young men frozen to death locked in each other's arms.

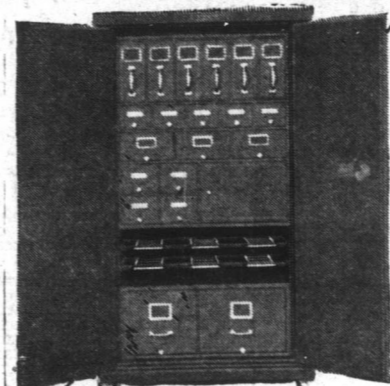

## \$100,000 Gift to Britain

An Estate for Breeding Army Remounts Has Been Presented.

London, Aug. 7.—Mr. George Pinckard, of Combe Court, Witley, has made a gift to the War Office of 450 acres of land, with kennels, stables, and cottages, for the purpose of breeding army remounts.

Since the advent of the motor car there has been incredible dimin-

tion in the number of horses in the British Isles, especially those available for military purposes. The War Office officials have unhesitatingly accepted Mr. Pinckard's patriotic present to the Nation, which is worth nearly \$100,000.

## COLLAPSE OF A FORTRESS
