

Rhodes Scholarship for 1924.

The election of the Rhodes Scholar for 1924 will be completed in the last week of September next, when candidates must be prepared to appear before the Committee.

Applications with ten typewritten copies of certificates and recommendations must be lodged with the undersigned not later than Saturday the 16th of September next.

The following are the conditions under which candidates are eligible to compete:

- They must be British subjects and unmarried.
- They or their parents must have been domiciled in the colony for five years immediately preceding the selection.
- They must have completed their second year at some recognized degree-granting University or College before going into residence at Oxford.
- They must have passed their nineteenth birthday, but not have passed their twenty-fifth birthday on October first of the year for which they are selected.

(Birth certificates must be submitted.)

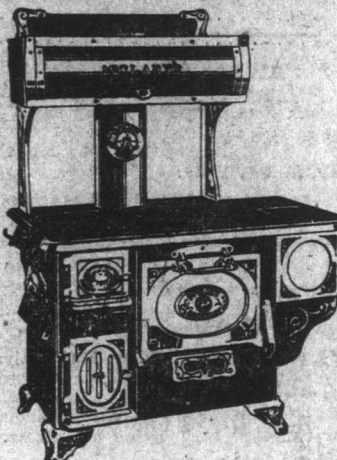

Loben, arrived there yesterday morning in ballast from Burnt Island, Scotland, to load pulp for England from the A.E. Reed Co. The ship reported having collided with an iceberg in the vicinity of the Grey Islands. Messages received by Hon. Tasker Cook from Captain Loben, state that the ship collided with a berg on Tuesday and that the damage sustained was to the forecastle head. The ship is receiving temporary repairs and meanwhile is having cargo placed on board.

Germans Will Abandon Passive Resistance in Ruhr Valley on Eight Conditions—Soldiers Digging Trenches in Attempt to Save Linguaglossa.

A SWEEPING DECREE.

DUSSELDORF, June 20.

A decree providing for the confiscation of all the Ruhr Valley industries, products of which are applicable to Reparations account, and forcing operation of the plants by Germans is being prepared by General Degoutte of the occupational forces, it was announced to-day. Arrangements for the promulgation of the decree are going forward as rapidly as possible, but owing to the wide scope of its measures and the extensive character of the industries affected, it was said, the French and Belgian authorities would require several days more in which to work out the details. The decree will give the military authorities absolute power over all metal works, iron and steel plants, mines, coke ovens and virtually all other private industries in the Ruhr. In the event of the Germans refusing to operate the plants, the decree provides for jail sentences up to fifteen years, and in addition heavy fines for directors and companies or others responsible for resistance. Those responsible for sabotage would be tried before a court martial and on conviction be subject to the death penalty. The decree will be most sweeping, giving the military authorities, in collaboration with the French Commission, authority to exploit the industries themselves or to lease the plants to concession accounts, if this is deemed better to the interests of the occupation authorities in their plan to obtain reparations.

THE GERMAN PRICE FOR ABANDONMENT OF PASSIVE RESISTANCE.

ELBERFELD, June 20.
Passive resistance would be abandoned in the Ruhr Valley on eight conditions, one of the most important of which is indemnification by the French and Belgians for all products of private industry which they have seized, says a memorandum to the Berlin Government reported to have been drafted here by representatives of employers authorized to act in the matter. Other stipulations are the removal of the Franco-Belgian Railway Administration, the return of all persons deported and the release of those persons imprisoned, the renunciation of all measures of force, the nullification of all restrictive control methods, the restoration of telephone and telegraph service and indemnification for all wounded and the families of those killed.

FISA HAD EARTHQUAKE SHOCK.

ROME, June 20.

A slight earthquake shock was felt at Fisa but no reports of damage have been received.

ONTARIO VILLAGE WIPED OUT.

COCHRANE, Ont., June 20.

The village of Noremberg, eighteen miles east of Cochrane, on the trans-continental railway, was destroyed by bush fires yesterday.

SEEKING TO DIVERT LAVA.

CATANIA, June 20.

Outside of Linguaglossa, the most unique engineering effort in being staged by a military corps with the hope of diverting the advancing sea of molten lava that is slowly creeping upon the town. Great ditches will be dug and entrenchments erected with the hope of diverting the stream to the right and left of the town and down a deep slope to the valley below.

WILL CELEBRATE MOUNT CASHEL SILVER JUBILEE.

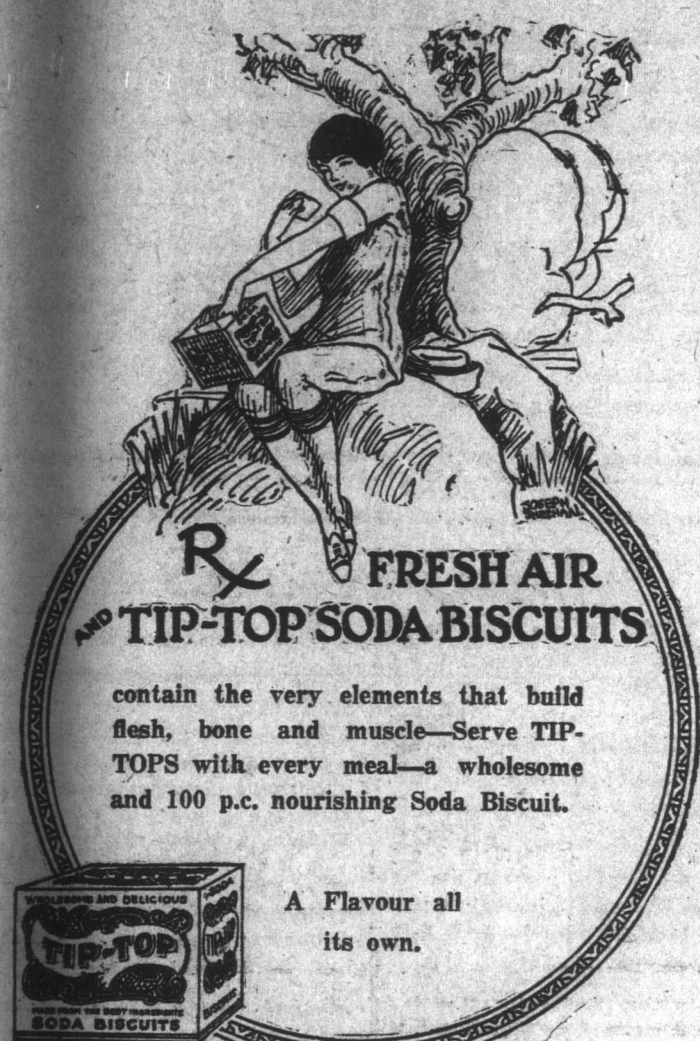
