Work To Be Begun On Scuttled German Ships.

Definite arrangements have now been made to begin salvaging operations shortly at Seeps Flow, where the German Fleet was scuttled in June, 1919. Mr. A. G. McBain, C.A., Glasgow, has carried through the purchase from the Admiralty of a portion of the sunken fleet on behalf of a company, headed by Mr. J. W. Robertson, convenor of the County of Zetland, who is to direct the salvaging operations.

The vessels sunk, it will be recalled, comprised ten battleships, five battle cruisers, five light cruisers, and twenty-nine destroyers, their total tonnage being about 418,000 tons. All the destroyers, it is contended, can be floated and broken up, but the raising of the capital ships, with the exception of the mighty Hindenburg and the Seydlitz, would not be a commercial success, as in practically all cases the capital ships went down in over twenty fathoms of water, an impossible depth for salvaging unless tremendous sums of money were expended.

The warships were sunk by the crews opening all the sea cocks and flooding the ships. Strange to say, owing to the method to be adopted by the salvors, this will assist their efforts. The Hindenburg, 700 feet long and of 27,000 tons displacement, which embodied all the lessons taught by the war, was completed but never commissioned, for after the trials she was interned at Scapa. She evidently did not sink according to plan. The Germans had apparently arranged for a larger inflow of water at one side, so that the vessel might capsize, and make refloating very difficult. She, however, sank on an even keel, and now rests upright, with her main deck just awash at low water, her fighting tops, tripod mast, and funnels standing stark above the water. Sea birds perch themselves on her monster guns. With the Seydlitz, whose length is 656 feet and whose tonnage is 24,610 tons, the Germans must have been more successful, for she lies on her starboard side, about one-third of the ship being visible at low water. Her guns, clearly visible, hang dejectedly from the turrets. At high water she is often mistaken for the point of one of the many small islands which are dotted over the waters at this part.

Visits Home After 40 Years' Absence.

Ottawa, July 9.—After an absence of forty years, during which time his relatives had given him up for dead and in which time he roamed through most of this continent, Clement L. Archambault, returned to the city Monday, and with some difficulty persuaded his relatives living here that it was no one else but he. After that the fatted calf was killed.

Naturally, Mr. Archambault finds Ottawa tremendously changed. Ottawa was nothing more than a miniature city when he left, he declares, and Sussex Street was the main street then.

Since his departure he has prospected, hunted and travelled all over the country, working chiefly as a railroad man. According to his own admission he had "made his pile."

He was now out sight-seeing and was visiting all his relatives. He has two brothers in this city. Mr. Archambault is at present employed with the Great Northern Railway in Seattle.

Things to Remember.

Use a hot duster when polishing furniture. It is well to have two dusters, place before the fire, and use alternately.

If the soles of the toddler's new shoes are sandpapered, he will be saved many a tumble.

Linoleum that has been stored should be placed in front of a fire for a few hours before unrolling, and there will be no danger of its cracking.

Any article that is to be slightly starched must be quite dry before it is dipped into the starch. Shake out, hang up to dry, sprinkle, roll up, and iron while still a little damp.

Silk underwear, ribbons, neckties, and blouses must be ironed before they are quite dry.

Soap should be kept in a warm dry place for some months before it is used. It goes much farther than if used when it is bought.

Keep all string from parcels; untie and roll in balls as you get it and it will be ready for use again.

If a drawer does not run smoothly, rub the edges well with beeswax.

Scratches on furniture can be removed by rubbing them with vinegar and paraffin, equal parts.

Bumper Apple and Potato Crops.

Ottawa, July 9.—The prospects for apple crops throughout Canada are good, according to the Fruit Branch of the Department of Agriculture for the Dominion. In British Columbia the crop is estimated to be 15 to 20 per cent. higher than in 1922. In Ontario the crop will probably be the same as last year, in Quebec, 50 per cent. of 1922; in New Brunswick, 75 per cent. of 1922, and in Nova Scotia is estimated to be 10 per cent. heavier than last year.

As for potatoes, the acreage in Alberta, Manitoba and Saskatchewan is about 97 per cent. of last year's acreage. British Columbia has 95 per cent. of last year's acreage in that province; Ontario, 93 per cent.; Quebec, 97 per cent.; New Brunswick, 93 per cent., and Nova Scotia, 94 per cent. of last year's acreage.

Toronto, July 9.—"Resolved: That no pictures which glorify war or which tend to perpetuate feelings of prejudice or hatred against people of other countries, be hung in schools."

This resolution recently passed by the Parent-Teachers' Association, composed of delegates from 38 societies of Vancouver, was brought to the attention of women here by a letter to the Globe written by Lucy Woodsworth, wife of the Labor member for Winnipeg. She is hoping that every school section in the country will take this question up. She realizes that the I.O.D.E., in exhibiting these war pictures, is actuated by high motives, but she does not believe in the principle and considers that the Vancouver resolution has significance for Canadian women.

Toilet Tips.

Don't use a greasy skin-food if your skin is oily. Wash the face daily with warm water and good soap; apply a good cream, leave on for five minutes, sponge off with cold water, dry gently, and then powder.

Midges can be kept away by touching the face and neck with oil of cloves.

You can remove a wart with lemon rind that has been soaked in vinegar for a fortnight. Tie a small piece on with a bandage at night; renew next night, and the wart will soon go.

To improve this arms, massage with warm olive oil. Nourishing foods, milk, malt extract, should be taken regularly, and the system kept up.

A good lotion for freckles is peroxide hydrogen 2 oz., eau de cologne 2 oz., rosewater 1 oz., glycerine half an ounce. Mix well and apply with a small brush.

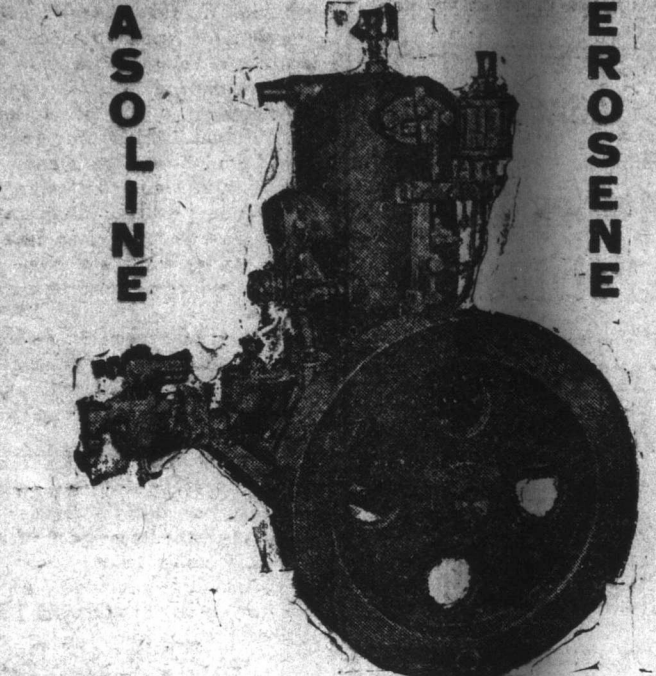
